ALIEN ENEMIES WOULD JOIN CANADIAN FORCES

Half of Those Interned at Kapuskasing Anxious to Fight for Allies.

TO ORGANIZE BATTALION

Col. F. S. Clarke, Who Was in Charge of Camp, Returns to Start Recruiting.

After having spent 13 months in looking after the prisoners interned in Kapuskasing, where 1300 alien enemies are being trained in Canadian citizenship, Col. F. S. Clarke has returned to Toronto and will immediately begin the recruiting campaign for the 12th Battalion, of which he has been appointed commanding officer. On Dec. 14, 1914, he left for Camp Kapuskasing, which is south of James Bay and went there to a winter under almost Arctic conditions.

Will Fight for Allies.

There is very little sickness at the camp, Col. Clarke declared, and he said there was a total absence of contagious diseases. The population of Ontario's year-old town is over 1600, of which 270 are troops, and a few score of civilians, together with soldiers' families.

Road building was the principal occupation of the 1300 Austrians and Turks last summer. About 35 miles of highway was constructed and preliminary work in clearing ground for an Ontario Government farm was begun. There have already been 600 acres cleared, and 400 more will be put in shape for cultivation.

There is no complaining among the interned prisoners, said Col. Clarke. Within the last six months there have been about 50 releases, and a great percentage of the prisoners feel that they should be allowed their liberty again, on account of the scarcity of laborers. Fifty per cent. of them would jump at the chance to serve with the Canadian forces.

Col. Clarke reported that his battalion has already reached half strength. Major B. Brown has been in charge of the battalion during the absence of the commanding officer. Col. Clarke leaves today for Ottawa, and on his return will complete the organization of his battalion.

MAKING PROGRESS IN BUILDING BATTALIONS

Queen's Own Paraded Over Six Hundred Strong at Armories Last Night.

INSPECT MEN TODAY

Hundred and Ninth to Hold Fifty Recruiting Meetings in Churches Next Sunday.

Relief from the congestion caused by four overseas units drilling in the armories at once is afforded by an order just issued by military headquarters. The 12th Highlanders will use the armories in the mornings and the 12th "Falls" and 16th Q.O.R. in the afternoons.

Enlistments totalled 83 yesterday, making 407 the number accepted for service with the colors during the first half of the week. Of these enlistments, 48 were credited to the 13th Highlanders and 25 to the 16th Queen's Own.

The overseas battalion of the Highlanders is now over 620 strong. It held a parade thru the city yesterday, headed by two bands. A thousand men in leather gloves for use by the members were purchased yesterday by the officers of the 13th Highlanders. Good progress is being made in building up the 16th Queen's Own Overseas Battalion. All of the 350 overseas already enrolled will be uniformed today. Two companies will be formed this morning. The Q. O. R. Regiment paraded last night under command of Lt.-Col. R. C. Levesque.
