Exhibition Management Ever on Alert to Secure Exceptional Pictures.

FOR CULTIVATED TASTE

A Few Canvases Not as Pleasing as Some Others This Year.

Art, according to modern canons as expressed at the National Exhibition may be either beautiful or barbarous, some of the most highly prized by the critics of the craft being of the latter rder. The fact that many of the subjects on view have been produced during the last fifteen years accounts for the glaring differences between work considered worthy of place in me and that which occupied the laces of honor in the preceding de-nde. The lay mind is sometimes uzzled to find wherein lies the value of a canvas cataloged at five or six thousand dollars, and one is forced to the conclusion that art of the futurist impressionist and other faddish variety is like eating olives—some-thing for which a taste must be ac-
