

WHOLESALE FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Grapefruit—The grapefruit market is slightly stronger, and prices on new arrivals are a little higher. Potatoes ranging from \$4.75 to \$5.50 per case; some still being offered at \$4 to \$4.50 per case. Cuscuta being at \$4 to \$4.50 per case.

DROP IN EXCHANGE SENDS GRAIN DOWN

Chicago Market Keeps Sharp Watch on Foreign Political Developments.

Chicago, Jan. 16.—Weakness that prevailed in the corn market today was apparently due, more or less, to new low records of exchange rates to Europe. The close was nervous at 1/4 to 1/2¢ down, with May \$1.32 1/2, and July \$1.30 1/2 to \$1.31 1/2. Oats lost 1/4¢ to 1/2¢. In provisions, the outcome ranged from 2 1/2¢ decline to 20¢ advance. Selling pressure against corn was rather heavy at times, and there was a sharp watch throughout the day on foreign political developments. The unrest abroad was associated with the unprecedented situation in regard to exchange, and was generally taken to indicate a more discouraging export outlook. In this connection, a good deal of notice was given to messages which told of export purchases of oats having been canceled. Increasing receipts of corn tended further to weigh on the market, and so likewise did the lower quotations on hogs.

Oats receded with corn, but on the decline obtained timely support from leading bulls. Slowness of cash demand was an element of weakness in provisions.
