ing them by going thoroughly into the details of such an important contract before signing it. They are not satisfied with it, and intend to send it to the people again.

"We should simply, as aldermen, be a parcel of fools to sign a contract that is," said Ald. Armstrong, "no more perfect as it is in its details. I have found Mr. Beck a man of great energy and patience, and yet when after three or four years of such close study he presents such a proposition to us to be rushed through on a moment's notice, and cannot give us answers to simple questions, it is well to investigate before we spend such large sums of the people's money. We do not propose to be browbeaten by Mr. Beck in the matter."

Ald. Armstrong said Mr. Beck was to blame in bringing personalities into the campaign. No one had mentioned Mr. Beck at the meetings before Mr. Beck did himself. Mr. McEvoy was too much of a gentleman to try to drag any lady's name into a discussion of this kind, and not until Mr. Beck did so was the lady's name mentioned.

Ald. Armstrong referred briefly to the taking of the Beck horses to the London exhibition, at the expense of the people, and also to the three-fifths clause.

Ald. Ferguson.

Ald. Ferguson was given a cordial reception. He thought it ill-became a man in Mr. Beck's position to try and belittle the council because they wanted to go through into such an important contract before spending the people's money. Because the council are businesslike enough to make sure they are right there is no reason they should be browbeaten by Mr. Beck, and told to hurry and rush such an important contract through. Every councillor has done his work well, and is acting in the best interests of the citizens.

Ald. Ferguson spoke of the failure of the Whitney Government to find any misappropriations in funds, notwithstanding the charges they had made against the Liberals. He also spoke of the La Rose mining deal. The Beck horse deal was not a square deal in any sense, and Mr. Beck had used his position to take an unfair advantage.

The Candidate.

Mr. J. M. McEvoy was tendered an ovation on rising to speak. "Right here at the start," he said, "I want to tell you that the statement that I am getting my figures from the Catorat Power Company is false. (Cheers.) Mr. Beck knows it is not true. Bylaw illegal.

The bylaw was passed illegally, as the statute says a printed copy must accompany the ballot so that the elector can see what he is voting on. This was not done. Afterwards, as far as the people were concerned, it was passed secretly in the Legislature.

"Why all this manipulation, if things are right? Why does not Mr. Beck come out fairly and squarely with his power contract? He dares not, and I challenge him to publish that contract." (Applause.)

A Big Change.

"Conservatives contended during the time of the Liberals that five ministers were ample, and indeed too many to look after the business of the Province."

"They opposed the creation of a minister of public works, and a minister of agriculture, on the ground of excessive expenses."

"They had scarcely got into office when they added one full minister under the name of president of the council, and three ministers without portfolio. They promptly added to each one of the minister's salary \$2,000 per annum and gave \$1,000 a year to each of the ministers without portfolio. They created a commissioner of railways to do part of the work that formerly had been done by members of the cabinet at an enormous expense. (Cheers.)"

"They created a superintendent of education to do a large portion of the work that had previously been done by the Minister of Education. They created a university board to do work that had formerly been done by the Minister of Education, but in the face of divesting themselves of all this work, they created one new minister and three new ministers without portfolio, and paid them all out of our money."

Challenge To Mr. Beck.

"I see that Mr. Beck claims great credit to himself and his Government for collecting a large amount of revenue, but I notice that he has not accepted my challenge to point out any constructive financial legislation of the present Government."

"The most they have done is to receive the money which was payable to them under the legislation enacted by the Liberal Government. (Cheers.)"
