

GEORGETOWN.

The Rev. Mr. Richey reports, that the past year has been to his parish one of unprecedented affliction and sorrow—two wardens and three vestry-men having fallen by the hand of death, weakening sadly the little flock in this parish. The names of those whose familiar forms we miss from the ranks of the Church Militant are: Messrs. J. E. W. Alleyne, A. W. LeBrocq, F. P. Norton, James Heggs and Thomas Owen, Esquire, our late Postmaster General. Mr. Richey, in company with Mr. Aldous, lately visited the Church in Murray Harbor, which they found in a state of great dilapidation, but containing several articles of church furniture in a state of good preservation, and which may be removed. Among others, there are thirty to forty good open seats, and also two Tables of Commandments.

The regular routine of Sunday services has been sustained through the year without interruption, and the festivals of the Church have been duly observed. The practice of catechising the children of both Trinity and St. Alban's Churches has been continued with much apparent profit. The hour of evening prayer at the parish church has been changed from 4 to 7, which seems to afford general satisfaction and to draw a larger attendance.
