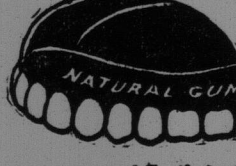

LATE LOCALS

Steamer Calvin Austin landed 50 passengers from Boston last night.

Steamship Victorian, of the Allan line, now on her way to this port, has about 80 passengers on board.

C. P. R. steamer "Montcalm," Captain Hodder, sailed today for Bristol via Liverpool, with a general cargo.

The endless prayers of Bishop Lawrence fame is again being circulated here. A copy was yesterday received by a prominent citizen from Windsor, N. S.

Wendall T. Gray, son of Dr. J. H. Gray, of Fairville, who has been twice ship wrecked, is expected to arrive home from Boston today or tomorrow.

The ferry steamer Ludlow went off the route this afternoon to be overhauled and have her boilers cleaned. Her place was taken by the Western Extension.

West India steamship Dahome, which sailed from Bermuda last Sunday, goes to Halifax, and is due there tonight or Thursday morning. She will be due here Saturday night.

Margaret Hayes, the woman who so narrowly escaped death in yesterday's fire on Sheffield street, still alive, though the hospital authorities hold out little hope for her recovery.

The local government held two sessions here yesterday, morning and afternoon, and Premier Robinson left for Fredericton today. The premier would give out little information, stating that nothing important had been done.

Elder-Dempster Mennon, Captain Purdon, arrived this morning from Barry, in ballast. The steamer will load a general cargo at the I. C. R. wharf for South Africa. She made the passage across the Atlantic in 13 days.

It is expected that a number of the members of the Grand Lodge will be present at the meeting of the I. O. L. O. L. No. 5, tomorrow evening, when District Master E. S. Hennigar and his staff will pay an official visit. There will also be an interesting programme.

The committee appointed by the common council to look into the condition of the public schools in case of fire will probably finish their labors this week and will be ready to report on or before Tuesday. The committee will also visit the churches and moving picture theatres. A member of the committee stated that in future their route would not be announced, as they had in certain places found evidence of preparation for their visit.

AT ST. LUKES CHURCH

Confirmation is being prepared for and the Bishop's visit is looked for on Sunday, April 12th.

Large Number of Visiting Milliners Are in the City Today

POLICE COURT

Several Interesting Cases Dealt With This Morning.

Charged with theft and violently resisting the police nineteen-year-old William Morris, better known perhaps as "Chuck," appeared in the police court this morning and after taking of evidence was remanded.

Morris was taken into custody by Deputy Chief of Police Jenkins yesterday afternoon, on suspicion of stealing junk from Jacobson and Wymann's shop-Ford street. The stolen articles consisting of a piece of copper and two brass taps were missed yesterday and as Morris had been loitering around the junk shop mentioned he was suspected of having taken it.

Morris put up a stiff snafu and had to be taken in a cart to the central police station. The deputy chief was assisted in making the arrest by I. C. R. Policeman John Collins.

John Bryden was fined \$8 or twenty days in jail for drunkenness and William Lineham forfeited a like amount, also for over indulgence in alcoholic stimulants.

John Brown (or Vaughan) who has been lodged in the jail on a charge of stealing coal from the Dominion Coal Co.'s large at York Point was again brought into court and further remanded.

Henry Hampton who was arrested on Tuesday last week for wandering about the street late at night and being unable to give a satisfactory account of himself to the police and who, according to evidence had struck his elder sister, as well as two of the younger members of the family, was brought into court and fined \$8 or two months in jail, but the fine was allowed to stand on condition that should he again annoy his mother or sisters a commitment would be sent out against him and he would be brought back to jail to serve out his term.


