WEATHER WAS MILD YESTERDAY; **OPEN CARS IN ORDER IN BOSTON**

Boston, Jan. 21.—A midwinter day with summerlike conditions made today in the greater part of New England one of the most remarkable from the weather point of view for many years. The 'official thermometer in Boston in the shade of the cold stone of the poet office roof reachiod 67.8 this afternoon, which was the warmest day in January with one exception, in the history of the local bureau. On January 1, 1876, the temperature reached 70. In the suburbs, however, where the full effect of the soft southerly air and the bright sun was felt, reliable instruments registered a trifle under 80 at 2 o'clock this afternoon.


