But it is nothing more or less than rank poison for a third baseman forever to play deep. A smart team can tap down more infield hits to a third baseman who plays deep than one would believe possible.

Red Smith's batting was pretty fair at the start of the season. He came up from Georgia in good shape, so far as the batting eye went. But Red then fell off in batting. Those healthy two-base blows which bustled up so many games in the late 1914 were absent. The best pitchers in the league were forever pitching against Red and the best pitchers kept Red breaking his back after slow balls, floaters and fade-aways, a species of the genus pitch Red never could hit.

But Red Smith's inability to make any stands on the base lines is presumably the biggest and best reason why he stands less than the slightest iota of a chance of being third sacker for the Braves next year. Red never did get
