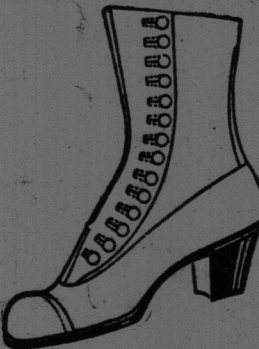

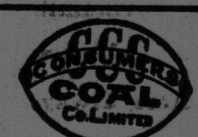

APRIL 20 AS SOCKS DAY FOR MEN AT FRONT

Red Cross Plan To Be Dominion-wide

Sending Serum Away; First From Canada—Toronto Girls' Unique Plan To Provide Coverlets—Fine Gift For Nurses

Toronto, April 1.—Recently some citizens of Hamilton proposed that a special day should be devoted to the purchase of socks for the soldiers. As one of the greatest needs of the late Mrs. Monica Borden, mother of Sir Robert L. Borden, premier of Canada was held at her

It has been suggested that Tuesday, April 20, be kept as "Socks Day" throughout Canada and on that day everyone will have an opportunity of doing something for the soldiers, even if it is only the purchase of one pair of socks, which would not cost more than thirty or forty cents. The various branches throughout the dominion are asked to give their hearty co-operation to this project.

Anti-Tetanus Serum.
The Canadian Red Cross Society has ordered from the anti-toxin department of the provincial board of health 5,000 doses of anti-tetanus serum. It will soon be forwarded to England and will probably be distributed partly to the French Red Cross Society and partly to the Canadian hospitals at the front. This is the first Canadian serum which has been sent abroad.

Owing to the prevalence of tetanus following wounds received in action in northern France, it has become almost a matter of routine to give each wounded soldier prophylactic doses of serum with a view to preventing the occurrence of lockjaw. It has been found very successful in its regard as well as in the treatment of the disease which formerly was incurred. Owing to the use of this serum the number of cases of lockjaw have greatly diminished.

A scheme has been inaugurated by the Girls' Fund of Toronto whereby the soldiers will benefit. This society has made 100 coverlets for convalescent soldiers and they are divided into ninety-two squares, each square of which contains the name of the girl who sewed it and paid ten cents for the privilege. Already 100 have been made and sent away and it is hoped that many other girls throughout the dominion will follow the example of the girls of Toronto.

In response to a letter written to Ambrose Monell, President of the International Nickel Company, requesting a subscription to the Canadian Red Cross Society for the purpose of sending nurses to the front under the auspices of the St. John's Ambulance Association, a check for \$10,000 was received by Noel Marshall, chairman of the executive of the Canadian Red Cross, from A.

TO SEND MOTOR TO DR. MACLAREN'S HOSPITAL

The St. John's Ambulance Association is desirous of providing a motor car for the use of No. 1 General Hospital, Canadian Expeditionary Force, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Murray MacLaren. Provision is not made by the government, the Red Cross or any other society for supplying the great need for rapid transit for the medical staff, especially needed in emergencies. It is hoped this necessity requires only to become known in New Brunswick to be supplied immediately.

The St. John Ambulance Association feels that many of the organizations now engaged in patriotic work in St. John and throughout the province and accomplishing such magnificent results, will be glad to contribute towards this fund, thus aiding Doctor MacLaren and his staff in their arduous and noble work of caring for the wounded soldiers.

The sum required for the car and its necessary equipment is \$1,000. The association hopes to be able to cable the necessary amount to Lt. Colonel MacLaren within a very short time.

CANADA AND THE EMPIRE

A Talk on Trade Matters By Commissioner Wickes

London, April 1.—Addressing the London Chambers of Commerce on trade with the Dominion of Canada and the empire, Hamilton Wickes, trade commissioner, expressed the opinion that Canada knew the worst and was now moving forward to better things. He expected the harvest of 1915 would do a great deal to relieve the situation, but the relief would not be fully realized until 1916, hence the watchword for the immediate future should be one of caution.

In comparing business methods, Mr. Wickes said the average Britisher was neither inquisitive nor acquisitive as regards available information, and while intensely self-reliant in some directions, he was strangely diffident to his powers in others. As a manufacturer the Britisher was without a peer; as a salesman he was without a knowledge of the markets or the science of selling as compared with his foreign neighbors. After explaining certain difficulties in connection with Canadian trade, Mr. Wickes offered general suggestions for improvement of overseas trade, amongst which were the organization of an intelligence department on a big scale and the registration of firms; also better co-operation between banker and manufacturers.

A declaration against the enticement at the present time of skilled laborers to emigrate, which was to the detriment of home industries, was applauded.

ENDS LIFE WITH POISON; JEALOUSY SAYS WITHAM

Houlton, April 1.—Mrs. Laura Adams Teed, better known as Laura Adams, took antiseptic tablets from the effects of which she died in the Aroostook hospital on Saturday evening. The cause of her taking them was jealousy, according to the claim of Arthur Witham.

Witham said:—"Laura came to me and asked if she could keep house for me, as she had no place to go. Her parents are dead. I told her she could stay at my house as long as she behaved herself. I have been divorced from my wife. Laura left her husband thirteen years ago and she expected to obtain a divorce from him at the coming April term of court.

"Her age was thirty-one years. She was born in Benton, N. B., after she left her husband. She leaves five brothers, two of whom are serving in the war in England, and one sister.
