

She went to Prague last year to try to get his pension increased, as he was in very bad health. Returning with stories of the wealthy friends she had made, of an alleged visit to President Masaryk, and the like, she induced 24 perentrust to her sums ranging from \$5,000 to \$15,000, altogether more than \$150,000.

She bought motor-cars, sent her invalid "father" to Italy, and lived luxriously until the bubble burst.


Jumps Out of Sick Bed; Jumps Into Pond; Saves Girl


