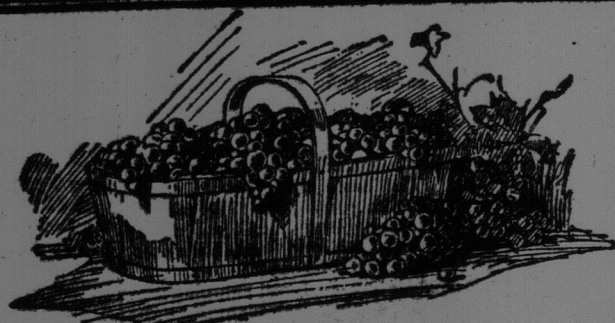

## SEEKS FINGER PRINTS OF ALIENS AND CITIZENS

Committee of State Chamber of Commerce Gives Report of Investigation.

New York, Oct. 7. — The finger printing of every person in the United States—citizens and aliens alike—is recommended in a report prepared by the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York.

The report is the result of an inquiry made by a sub-committee, and emphasizes the importance of finger printing as a protective measure which would make difficult the evasion of clever and dangerous aliens sent here for the purpose of spreading discontent among the unassimilated elements of our population.

The report declares that with a general finger-printing system in effect it would be possible, by proclamation of local authorities during "such periods as may be deemed expedient," to require all persons to carry cards of identification. The value of the system in the detection of election frauds and as a means to check crime are brought out in detail.

"To bankers the advantages of permissive finger printing by which the identity of their clients could be definitely established is too obvious to require detailed elucidation, but it may be pointed out that the merit of this system appears particularly pronounced in the case of issuing letters of credit.

"The difficulty in the administration of the law relating to the carrying of concealed weapons in this state has been not so much in the number of weapons possessed by an individual, as from the circumstances, that the authorities have no adequate means of checking the identity of the person who may bear a card in accordance with the law. In other words, in the regulation of the sale of firearms the committee feels that instead of going to the length in the bill introduced in Congress by Senator Shields, of checking the identity of the person who has a real need of a means of self-protection for their homes under present conditions.

Advantage to Bankers.  
"In order to overcome the practical difficulty of educating the public to accept a general system of finger-print identification, to which, as a matter of fact, the committee can see no valid reason upon which any honest man, after due thought, can base objection, it is suggested that registration for the purpose of identification by finger print be permissive in the first instance and not mandatory, and it is the opinion of the committee that should this provision be carried into effect by law, all insurance companies dealing in burglary insurance will avail themselves of the opportunity so afforded to issue policies offering a differential in rates in favor of all employers requiring the presentation and record of finger print certificates of identification issued by the government, over those employers who carry on their business in the present fashion.

## ASKS OPERATION ON BANDIT

Roy Gardner's Wife Says It Might Reform Him.

Leavenworth, Kan., Oct. 7.—Mrs. Dollie Gardner, wife of Roy Gardner, notorious bandit, is anxiously awaiting word from Washington as to whether the government will permit an operation on her husband, who is confined in the Federal prison here. The operation would be to relieve a supposed brain pressure which is said to cause Gardner's criminal tendencies. Mrs. Gardner arrived from California to be present at the operation.

"Although I was disappointed when I learned the permit had not been received, I have not given up hope," Mrs. Gardner said.

"I cannot say why the government will not permit it. It certainly will not make Roy any worse, and if it accomplished his reform he would be the gainer."

**JAPS MAKING COCAINE.**  
A Japanese syndicate has acquired large estates in the far interior of Peru and is manufacturing, on a huge scale, cocaine and other alkaloids which it ships from the obscure port of Eten after packing the drug over mountain ranges by using the more accessible port of Callao. The natives of Peru chew the coca leaf as a stimulant to such an extent that they have become degraded to a plane slightly above that of animals, while in Chile, where the drug is unknown, the Araucanian tribe is a strong virile race that the white armies have never conquered.

## SERIOUS CHARGES MADE AGAINST EXECUTIONERS

Hanging of Bennie Swin Took More Than an Hour Although the Prisoner was Unconscious All the Time — Statements by Deputy Sheriff and Physician.

Details in connection with the hanging of Bennie Swin at Woodstock, yesterday, during which the body was cut down before life was extinct, necessitating a second hanging, were given last evening by Deputy Sheriff H. V. Moores. Mr. Moores' story is as follows:

"Bennie Swin was brought out of his cell at 5 o'clock, supported by two men. He was led to the scaffold. During this time the doomed man kept praying continuously. The black cap was placed over his head and the noose adjusted. When this had been completed Doyle sprang the trap and immediately went down and opened the door. He asked the doctors present to go in and examine Swin. Dr. Griffin, the official jail doctor, Dr. Grant McIntosh, and a visiting doctor named Mapplebeck, all entered along with the sheriff, deputy and other officials. Dr. Grant took the stethoscope and started to examine Swin's heart, while Dr. Griffin and Dr. McIntosh looked on. I did not hear what they were saying, but I took for granted that they pronounced him dead. Gill, I think, said the rope Swin was then carried into the jail and placed on a bed.

"They were just about to bring in the jury when the doctors noticed that he was breathing. All gathered around him and evidently concluded he would live for only a few minutes, but instead of that his pulse was evidently getting stronger. They must have waited nearly an hour and then evidently concluded the hanging would have to be done over again. In the meantime Doyle had retired to his room in the jail building. When it was decided to take Swin back to the scaffold Doyle was not disturbed, as he was not in a fit condition. He had been drinking heavily and was apparently too drunk to realize what he was doing. Gill performed the second hanging and made a good job of it. The body was cut down for nineteen minutes. At that time Swin was dead and the body was carried into the jail and placed on a bed. The body was then passed over to Jessie Foster, an uncle of the deceased.

"The body of Bennie Swin was taken to his former home at Mainstream and the funeral will take place there tomorrow (Saturday). Mainstream is five miles back of Hartland. Hangman "Doyle" was kept in the jail until the afternoon and was then escorted to Teed's Mills, six miles out of Woodstock, and from there he was escorted to Montreal. Deputy Sheriff Moores said they did not think it advisable to let him out during the day as there was a strong feeling against him due to alleged remarks made to Swin, some of which were exaggerated.

Sheriff Foster left today for his home in Hartland. It is recognized that the sheriff did all a man could do and that he is in no way to blame for the mishap.

**Physician's Statement.**  
Dr. Griffin, the official jail physician, when interviewed by The Telegraph reporter regarding the taking down of Swin before he was dead, said:

"I do not know who ordered him cut down. Dr. Grant had been listening with a stethoscope and turned to hand the instrument to me when the body was cut down. I did not see who actually cut the rope. Swin was unconscious when he was carried into the jail. I was examining him looking for a fracture. His neck had not been broken. I discovered a dislocation between the third and fourth vertebrae and while I was working with him he began to revive. I advised the sheriff that the only thing to do was to hang him over again. The sheriff was fortunate in having hangman Gill present for he made a good job the second time. Bennie Swin was not conscious at any period."

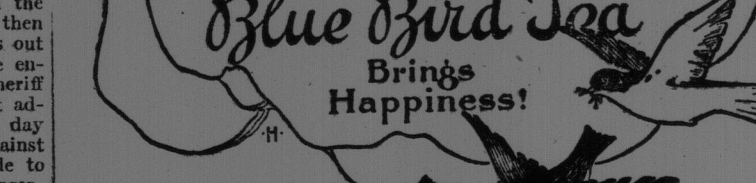
