55 LIVES LOST IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

Statistics Submitted by Deputy Coroner to Meeting Discussing Prevention—23 Children Killed.

For the purpose of ascertaining the causes of street accidents and fatalities, and discussing means for their prevention, a meeting was called by the Automobile Club of Canada yesterday afternoon in the club's headquarters, New Birk Building. Representatives from the Juvenile Delinquents Court, the Coroner's Court, the city police department, the School Commissioners, and transportation companies were present. The question was discussed and some suggestions were made.

J. A. Duchastel, president of the club, as chairman, referred to the alarming increase in the number of fatalities, and explained the purpose of the meeting. Mr. Lorenzo Prince, deputy coroner, submitted statistics showing the number of fatalities which have occurred during the present year to date. Of the fifty-five automobile fatalities, twenty-three of the victims were children under ten years of age, the average being seven years. In five cases the children were hanging on passing horse drawn vehicles, had either jumped or fallen in front of passing motor cars. Women drivers did not figure in any of the fatalities, it being the consensus of opinion that the women were more conscientious in preventing accidents. One way streets such as St. James and Notre Dame were condemned from the point of view of cars being parked on the wrong side of the street, one fatality being ascribed to this cause. Taxi drivers and truckers, Mrs. Havelock Wilson and Miss Jane McJunkin, all of this city, and Miss Mary and Miss Elizabeth, of New York.

Safety First Lectures.
Fatalities to children being the particular concern of the meeting, it was felt that a severe penalty for those who are frequently summoned for contraventions of the law would have a good effect. Education of school children by posters placed in the school rooms, safety first lectures aided by moving pictures, and the compilation of a catechism of safety rules would also help. The erection of school zone signs, and on amendment to the law requiring vehicles to slow down within these zones were suggestions advanced. The speed of motor vehicles was mentioned by one of the coroner commissioners, who stated that motorists should educate themselves first in using the public thoroughfares and that more supervision in the matter of chauffeur's licenses be exercised.

R. Reuben Wanmaker.
The death of R. Reuben Wanmaker, of Nauwigewauk, Kings county, removes a highly respected member of that community. He was an elder of the Nauwigewauk Christian church and superintendent of the Sunday school. He leaves, besides his wife and two small children, his mother, Mrs. C. A. Wanmaker of Nauwigewauk, three brothers, Herbert A., of British Columbia, Joseph W. and Harry H., of Grand Lake (N. B.). One sister, Mrs. T. W. Kay of Amherst (N. S.), also survives. He was a general storekeeper at Nauwigewauk.

MARINE NOTES.

R. Ray Kenney, son of Captain L. A. Kenney, 309 Lancaster street, west end, third officer of the steamer Canadian Trader, on his arrival at Montreal from Swansea, Wales, was transferred to the same position on the Canadian Logger which sailed recently from Montreal to British West Indies, commencing a winter schedule with sailings in future from Halifax.

The summer season of the Eastern Steamship Lines, between this city and Boston was concluded on Saturday with the sailing of the steamer Governor Dingley. The steamer in charge of Captain Ingalls has made forty-six round trips this winter. If a small steamer which could handle about three hundred tons of freight and a limited number of passengers can be secured there may be a weekly service.

TOTAL RECEIPTS NEARLY \$20,000

Floor Collapses With Large Crowd—The Protestant Orphans' Fair Brought to a Close—The Prize Winners.

A space of about fifteen by sixty feet of the floor in St. Andrew's collapsed on Saturday night under the weight of the large crowd on it. As the floor slowly started to give most of the people were able to get away from the spot, and only about thirty being on it when it struck the ground, five feet below. The only one injured was Mrs. Leggett, who had one of her ankles hurt. The gross receipts from the fair, which was brought to a close Saturday were nearly \$20,000. It is expected that the net will be considerably less on account of the high expenditures. The attendance of the last night was a record for the two weeks the fair has been running, nearly 3,000 being present. Three policemen were at the gate to control the admittance. 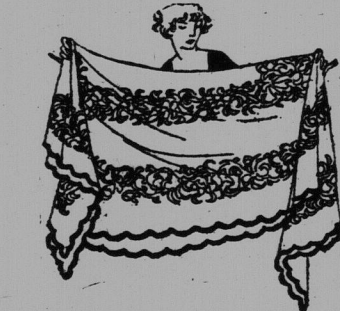
