

## MEIGHEN ATTACKS HON. MR. DOHERTY, ONTARIO MINISTER

Former St. John Man Blamed  
For Stirring up Cattle Agitation in Britain—Cold Storage Facilities For Maritime Province Ports.

Ottawa, April 20.—Discussion on department of agriculture estimates today, centering around the British embargo on Canadian cattle, brought forth lengthy statements on the history of the embargo, and finally aroused Hon. W. R. Meighen, minister of agriculture, to remark that it was hoped the embargo would be removed within a reasonable time. Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen and Hon. S. P. Tominie, former minister of agriculture, scored Hon. Manning Doherty, Ontario minister of agriculture, for his methods in endeavoring to secure the removal of the embargo. Mr. Doherty, Mr. Meighen charged, had gone to England and there initiated propaganda among the British people against the British government. The ill-feeling aroused in this way, Mr. Meighen declared, was one of the chief obstacles in the way of opening the British cattle market.

Great Britain as the market for surplus Canadian farm products was urged by Mr. Meighen, who declared his surprise at finding only one cold storage plant and abattoir in the maritime provinces and that one at Charlottetown. It was hoped that the export trade facilities would shortly be improved by the establishment of further cold storage facilities at maritime centres. This announcement was greeted with applause from eastern members who had urged the advisability of this course.

## STEAMSHIP MEN FIGHT THE UNION

Montreal, April 20.—Local steamship companies were today taking the names of men willing to work under the new wage schedule of the Canadian Shipping Federation which makes a cut of ten cents an hour in the day rates of pay for stevedoring and a larger cut in night rates. This move on the part of the shipping firms is the result of a definite break between the longshoremen of Montreal and the shipping federation and grows out of the action of a mass meeting of longshoremen last night, at which the offer of the new wage was rejected. Shipping men said today that they had taken several hundred names of men who will commence work on the new terms when the first ocean boats arrive next week.

## TV O CAUGHT IN FIRE ESCAPE CHASE

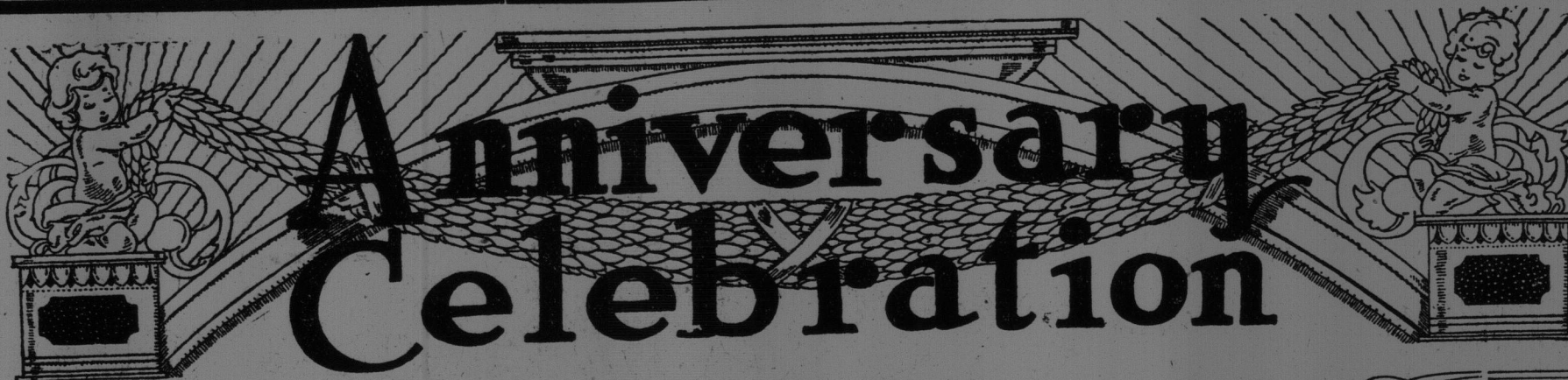
Twenty Shots are Fired by  
Police Rounding Up Alleged  
Loft Burglars.

Two alleged loft burglars, one of them Nathan "Waxy" Gordon, were captured after an exciting chase just after daybreak yesterday morning, after they had stepped from an airway at 31 East Twenty-seventh street and had brushed past Detectives Lawrence and Ryan of the Safe and Loft Squad. The block was surrounded quickly by uniformed policemen, and twenty or more shots were fired before the men were captured, on the sixth-floor fire escape of the Hotel Sinton, 35 East Twenty-seventh street.  
Lawrence and Ryan at first thought the men were watchmen, but when they did not answer a call to come into the street the detectives became suspicious. Then the men caught sight of a private watchman in uniform and took to their heels. They ran back of the building, and for a moment were lost to view. Lawrence and Ryan blew their whistles and fired several shots to bring aid. Soon they had the hotel and the adjoining loft building surrounded. Across the way is Madison Square Garden.  
"Waxy" and his companion, the detectives said, re-entered the loft building, but leaving by a basement window they ran through the courtyard of the Hotel Sinton and began climbing the hotel's fire escape. The detectives fired several shots, but as heads came popping out of the hotel windows they held their fire while several policemen ascended by the hotel elevator to head off the fugitives. Just as Policemen Dennis Cronin and another policeman reached the top floor of the hotel, a window marked "Fire Escape" opened and the two fugitives climbed in. Cronin covered both and quickly searched them for weapons. They were unarmed, and offered little resistance. Gordon and his partner, who said he was David Teitel, 22 years old, 916 Tiffany street, the Bronx, a salesman, were taken to the East Thirty-fifth street station house. Detectives found both of silk valued at \$20,000 piled up on the stairs. The largest haul was obtained from Benjamin Heller, on the fourth floor. Harold Love, on the seventh floor, and Samuel Silverstein, on the fourth floor with Heller, appeared as complainants. The prisoners were held without bail for examination today by Magistrate Hattings.

### CATHOLIC GAINS GROW.

New Directory Shows a 68 Per Cent. Increase Over 1920.

The official Catholic Directory for 1922 shows that the Catholic Church's gains in the U. S. in 1921 were 68 per cent. greater than in the previous year. The increase in the United States proper was 219,158. In the United States and its

possessions there are 28,538,048 Roman Catholics, and of this number 18,104,804 are in the United States. The total gains were 435,189, the largest reported for several years.

There was an increase of 406 priests, the total now being 22,040. In 1921 there were 204 new parishes established and 8,698 young men were enrolled in the 218 theological seminaries, which is an increase of 407 over the year 1920. Seven

new colleges for boys and eight new academies for girls were built. There are 1,852,498 children in the 6,258 free parochial schools. This is an increase of 81,080 children and of 210 schools in 1921.

The directory gives the total Catholic population of the Archdiocese of New York as 1,473,291. There are 175,538 children under Catholic care. The number of priests in the 886 churches under

Archbishops Patrick J. Hayes is 1,141. There were 2,573 converts reported. The directory is late in appearing, it having been held up to obtain facts about the new Pontiff.
