HOME FROM BOSTON.

J. E. Tigue returned to the city today from Boston, where he has been attending a meeting of the International Longshoremen's Association.

BETTER CONDITIONS.

The board of health reports a falling off in notifiable diseases. Scarlet fever and diphtheria are the only two notifiable diseases of which there is record in the city at present.

BANK CLEARINGS.

St. John bank clearings this week were \$2,665,809; last year, \$3,177,079; in 1919, \$2,901,548. Halifax clearings this week were \$3,182,269, and in Moncton they were \$1,486,014.

Townsend presented to Mr. and Mrs. Burns on behalf of the many a handsome traveling bag. The party broke up about twelve o'clock, after an evening of enjoyment with games, dancing and music.

SOME HOPE FOR MR. TWEEDDALE

Base of Skull Fractured and Condition Serious But Not Hopeless.

Messages received in the city today agree that Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, who was injured at his home in Arthurville, as reported yesterday, is in serious condition, though today there was expressed some hope that he might recover.

From his physician, Dr. Earle of Perth, came word that Mr. Tweeddale's skull was fractured at the base and that while his condition was very serious it was not regarded as hopeless. At best, however, it would be five or six weeks before he could be around.

The liquor commission, of which Mr. Tweeddale is chairman, was to have met on April 1, but this meeting now will likely have to be deferred.

SOME WORD ABOUT APPROPRIATION FOR THE HARBOR

The secretary of the board of trade received a telegram yesterday from Hon. R. W. Wignmore in which he stated that it was intended to make an appropriation of \$1,250,000 for work at Courtenay Bay and general harbor works. A special appropriation will be made for work on the Negro Point breakwater.

AN ASSESSMENT MATTER IN PARISH OF LANCASTER

Question of Valuation of Horses and Automobiles for Taxation.

A meeting of the Parish of Lancaster Highway Board, the board of assessors and the councillors of the parish was held in the office of the county secretary, J. King Kelley, yesterday afternoon and continued in the evening until eleven o'clock. The assessment of the Parish of Lancaster was the subject of discussion, more particularly as it is affected by an act passed at the last session of the legislature directing the assessors to prepare a separate column in the assessment roll for automobiles and horses. A difficulty has arisen over the clause in the act which directs the assessors to assess automobiles and horses at one third of their actual value.

It was said that it was not the intention of the county council that this clause should have been inserted in the act, that the councillors for the parish intended that the assessors should fix a fair rate for horses and automobiles and that they should be the judges of what was fair. In order that the assessment might be completed within the time allowed in order to avoid much litigation which it was feared that clause might bring about, Amador W. Anderson of the highway board was appointed to interview the premier and seek to secure from him an undertaking that legislation will be introduced and passed at the coming session of the legislature giving effect to the views of the councillors, assessors and the highway board of Lancaster.

IT CAME WITH A VENGEANCE

Four-fifths of an inch of rain fell in twenty minutes last night. The total rainfall of yesterday and last night amounted to an inch and one tenth and the greater part of the precipitation came in two heavy showers. The first at about 8.15 in the evening brought a downpour of a tenth of an inch in a few minutes and the second commencing at 9.55 and lasting until 10.15 was a regular torrent. In that time four-tenths of an inch of rain fell. The streets were well washed by the heavy storm and this morning the bright sun shone on bare surfaces that had been covered with packed ice for many weeks.

AWAY TODAY TO AUTHORS' MEET

Rev. H. A. Cody to Leave for Montreal This Afternoon—Speaks of Objects of Meeting.

Rev. H. A. Cody will leave this afternoon for Montreal where he will attend the convention of Canadian authors on Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. They will be entertained at a banquet at the University Club on Friday evening. Mr. Cody expects to return to St. John on Sunday morning. In speaking of the calling of the convention Mr. Cody said that while it had long been felt that there should be in existence some means of co-operation for the followers of the author's craft in order to gain for them greater influence there was at the present time an added need of such an organization when the dominion parliament was to consider copyright legislation.

The preliminary committee which arranged the convention consisted of Stephen Leacock, chairman, J. M. Gibbon, F. W. Wallace, J. J. Hartell and B. K. Sandall, secretary. It was hoped to obtain the active support of a large number of Canadian authors in Canada and the United States, and a large attendance at the convention was expected.

Mentioning a few of the authors that he thought would attend, Rev. Mr. Cody named Arthur Stringer, Bliss Carmen, Sir Arthur Currie, Prof. Arthur McMeachan, Dr. George H. Locke, Prof. W. P. Allison and Duncan Campbell Scott.

All the authors are to have opportunity to take part in the discussions and to help formulate the views of the convention. Definite statements regarding the authors' position in regard to publishing contracts and foreign contracts and fees for dramatic performances, it is expected, will be given out and the intention is to establish a permanent body to carry on the work in the best interests of the literary profession.
