SASKATCHEWAN'S SUCCESS WITH ITS AIR BOARD

Regina, Sask., April 12.—An executive of seven comprising three civilian and four military aviators, has been formed to carry on the work of the air board in this province for the ensuing year.
The first term of the provincial board, which covered a period from July, 1920, to March 31 of this year, was very successful. During the term 80 mechanics and 20 officers were sent from Saskatchewan to Camp Borden. Something in the nature of a record was made during this period as the board was able to purchase its own office equipment out of the balance of the government grant. It is believed that this is the only provincial organization in the Dominion which has been able to handle its finances with that degree of success.

Various resolutions dealing with aviation regulations and administration have been forwarded to Ottawa. One of them asks for a general convention representative of aviation over the entire Dominion, to discuss the question of security.

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CARUSO ABLE TO WALK BUT NOT YET TO SING

Caruso's convalescence has been so rapid that he is able to walk around his suite in the Hotel Vanderbilt most of the day, and could take an automobile ride occasionally if he wished. He has not yet chosen to leave the hotel, although it is probable that he may go out some day this week.

Despite this rapid improvement there is no truth in the reports that he has been able to sing a few bars of his favorite operas. Bruno Zitrin, his secretary, and officials of the Metropolitan are authority for the statement that he has not sung a note since he was stricken with pleurisy in December.

Although Mrs. Caruso and other members of the family had planned early in Caruso's convalescence to take him to Atlantic City or Lakewood until he had recovered sufficient strength to make the journey to Italy, they have decided to remain in the Vanderbilt until the physicians decide that the tenor is strong enough to take the ocean voyage. That may be early in May, but no definite plans have been made.

The tenor eats three meals a day, and there has been no trouble in the pleural cavities since March, when the fever subsided after a minor incision had been made. He is cheerful, and the nervousness of the early period of his convalescence has passed.

Caruso's illness has caused him to lose a great deal of weight, but neither he nor his physicians know how much he weighs. But he is rapidly approaching the desired weight, and his strength is returning. It is probable that he will attempt to remain under the 200-pound mark.

Although some of Caruso's friends during the worst of his illness had despaired of his chances to recover his voice and health, all believe that the tenor will be back in the Metropolitan for the next season "better than ever."

"Will he sing again?" says his secretary. "O, my, yes, certainly. He is the great Caruso."

COLOR SIGNALS FOR MOTORISTS ON ROADS

Installation of a National System Similar
to Railways is Advocated.

Trenton, N. J., April 12.—Installation of a national system of color signals for the control of motor traffic on national and State highways similar to the standardized use of red, yellow,

and green in railroad systems is suggested by highway officials of New Jersey, who have approved a bill for adoption of the plan in this State.

The bill, which contains measures approved by the committee on standards of the American Association of State Highway Officials, would have red signs to indicate first degree danger, such as railroad crossings, dead ends of roads, or lift bridges; yellow, indicating second

degree danger at curves or grades, and green, showing moving or traffic danger, and which is only to be used at road intersections.

Many national organizations interested in the move to reduce the annual automobile toll have expressed their indorsement of the bill's proposals. Two hundred American cities and towns are reported already to have adopted this color signal project.
