## HALF MILLION DOLLAR COMPANY

Hon. W. H. Thorne, W. H. Harrison and C. F. Sanford Incorporated—Railway Service Curtailed.

Fredericton, N. B., July 20.—W. H. Thorne, W. H. Harrison and C. F. Sanford, all of St. John, are incorporated as Thorne Realty Company, Limited, with head office in St. John, and total capital stock \$500,000. The company is authorized to carry on business in lands, buildings and other real estate. Arthur W. McInnes and J. Firth Brittain of St. John, and Urban V. Caulfield of Grand Bay, are incorporated as the Grand Bay Outing Association, with head office at Westfield, and with power to acquire real and personal property not to exceed \$10,000. The association is to promote sports and recreation.

John Morrissey, Charles J. Morrissey, Eugene Connelly and William L. Durick, all of Newcastle, and George M. McDade of Chatham are incorporated as the John Morrissey Furniture Company, Limited, with head office in Newcastle and capital stock of \$25,000. The company is authorized to take over and carry on the business now being carried on by John Morrissey, Newcastle, Caraguet and Dalhousie, also to carry on the business of lumbering and manufacturing lumber in all its branches. The C. N. R. has notified shippers in Fredericton and other places that after July 21 there will be only a tri-weekly freight service between Fredericton and Newcastle instead of daily. The cause of the curtailment is slack business. With improvement in conditions the daily service will be restored.

## RAIN GENERAL, FIRE DANGER IN N. B. PASSES

Fredericton, N. B., July 20.—The department of lands and mines reports that the heavy rain on Tuesday night was general all over New Brunswick and that now there is no danger from forest fires.

Isaac Brown died this morning at the home of Fred Dunphy, Nashwaak, his son-in-law. He leaves his wife, one son, Benjamin of Moncton, and one daughter, Mrs. Dunphy of Nashwaak. Two men brought here from McAdam on a charge of robbing the store of Charles Anderson, have been remanded until Friday. They are defending the case.

A report of crop conditions in Kings county is that there has been a heavy drop of apples and hay in about a three-quarter crop. The recent rains have improved the grain. Raspberries promise a good crop. New potatoes have been shipped and the potato crop looks well. Gooseberries and currants are reported a poor crop. Haying is well advanced with marsh hay particularly heavy. Fall weather is wanted to gather the crop.

## SUICIDE IN THE POLICE STATION

Youth Arrested Following Theft at Musquash.

Inquest will be Held—Found He Had Used Belt to Hang Himself from Ventilator—A Law Point in the Case.

Four hours previous to the time set for his appearance in the police court on a charge of theft, Leon Theodore Blethon committed suicide by hanging himself this morning in a cell in the central police station. The hanging took place sometime between 4:40 and 6 o'clock. Coroner F. L. Kenney was summoned and empaneled a jury.

Blethon, or Fred Whidden, which is believed to be his correct name, was arrested on Monday at McAdam by the C. P. R. police on suspicion of stealing \$241, the property of Mrs. H. Shepherd of Musquash. He was brought to the city on Monday evening and lodged in a cell at the central police station as there is no jail in Fairville at present and it was there that he was to be given a hearing before Magistrate W. H. Alingham. Policeman Chisholm brought a prisoner to the station at 4:40 this morning and in passing Blethon's cell, noticed that the man was there and that all appeared well. About six o'clock Night Deskman Thomas found Blethon in his cell, dead. He had taken off his belt and fastened one end of it around the bars in the ventilator in the ceiling of his cell. The other end he fastened around his neck. It is supposed that he had then stepped up on the bench in his cell and jumped off.

The coroner was notified and empaneled a jury composed of J. H. Walker, (foreman), D. Burke, Roy Fotts, James Flood, F. K. Melliday and Gordon Stevens. The jury viewed the body about noon and the coroner gave permission to remove it to Breen's undertaking room. The inquest was then adjourned until Friday evening in the court rooms in Germain street at 8:30 daylight time.

The death of the unfortunate youth who was only nineteen years of age, raises a regular point of law. He was arrested on theft charge, and brought to the city. He had money with him when arrested. Now arises the question of the ownership of the money. Nothing has been proved against Blethon and it has never been established that he stole the money.

Blethon was employed about the camp of the N. B. Construction Co. at Musquash and boarded at the home of Mrs. Shepherd. The money was taken on Sunday while Mrs. Shepherd was at church. She had placed some of the money under a pillow in her bedroom and the remainder in another part of the house. Upon her return from church she discovered her loss and reported the matter to the police. The result was that Blethon was arrested at McAdam on suspicion of stealing the money. It was said today that it has been established that his right name is Fred Whidden of Oldtown, Me. A telegram was received at police headquarters this morning from Dana L. Whidden of Oldtown which said that he would arrive in the city tonight to take charge of the body of his brother.

## BELYEA PLANS TO LEAVE ON FRIDAY

Mounties in Football Match Tomorrow—Other Local Sporting Events.

Hilton Belyea has been formally entered for the Canadian Henley, to be held at St. Catharines on August 6th. He has also been entered for the champion singles at Buffalo the next day. Robert Belyea has been entered for the intermediate championship at Buffalo. Accompanied by Harry Belyea, they will leave for St. Catharines on Friday and will go into training there.

Hilton Belyea's new shell, which is being built by Harry Belyea, will probably be finished today.

J. C. Chesley, who accompanied the champion to the Boston meet, intends to witness the events at St. Catharines and Buffalo, but will not leave here for some time.

The football game between the mounted police team and the aggregation from the Central Athletic Association will be played tomorrow evening at 8:45. On account of no grounds being available in the city the game will be played on a strip of land in the rear of the Municipal House. This ground has only recently been reclaimed from the sea during the dredging activities at Courtney Bay and it proves to be admirable for football.

The line-up of the mounties is as follows:—Backs, Tingley and Stewart; half backs, O'Donnell (capt.), Chalmers and Piddler; forwards, Lawson, Davy, Leyland, Winnie and Wilson; goal, Henderson. O'Donnell and Stewart played against the All-Scotch team which was in Canada this summer. The mounties' team have an enviable record, having won fifteen games, drawn three and lost only two. The line-up for the Central Association will be announced tomorrow.

A very interesting game of ball was played last evening at Rollaway between Fair Vale and Furness Witherby & Co., Ltd., ending in a tie, 5 all. Furness Witherby & Co. were well under way to adding another win to their string of victories, when time was called the score being 10 to 5 in their favor. Neither of these teams has suffered defeat this season and a good game is expected next week when they will clash with the Furness Witherby & Co., E. Thomson and D. Howard and for Fair Vale, the Higgins brothers.

A fast game of ball was played on the Crown street diamond last evening when the Fairville Nationals defeated the Imperials by the score of 12 to 4. Batteries, for the winners, Nelson and Snodgrass; for the losers, Mulaney and Sparks.
