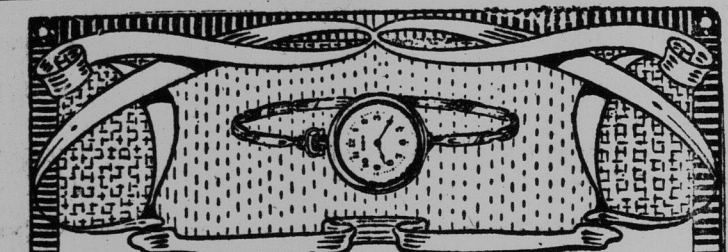

ROUMANIAN QUEEN TO VISIT CANADA

Daughter of the Late Duke of Edinburgh — Mother Virtually Prisoner in Germany During War.

Queen Marie of Roumania will visit Canada next year. So announced Madame Pantazi of Bucharest, a former Canadian, in her address on conditions in Roumania and eastern Europe, before the Hamilton Canadian Club. Queen Marie has recently been staying in Switzerland visiting her mother, the widowed Duchess of Edinburgh and of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, who has been staying for nearly a year past at a hotel in the neighborhood of Zurich.

The dowager duchess is the only daughter of Cesar Alexander II, who liberated the serfs. She married Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh, son of Queen Victoria, who, on the death of his father, succeeded to the throne as sovereign Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. The only son of the marriage was driven to suicide by the treatment which he received at Berlin while under the maternal care of Emperor William, for which the duchess has ever since entertained the most bitter resentment.

On the death of her husband, her nephew, the Duke of Albany, then at Elton, succeeded as Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. He eventually fell under the influence of the Kaiser, developed an antagonism toward his aunt, whom he treated abominably, identified himself entirely with the former Kaiser's sons, and during the war displayed a hatred toward the British people of the land of his birth, that even went beyond that of most of the native German soldiers and princes.

He took no steps to protect his aunt, the dowager duchess, when the war broke out. As a personal foe of the Kaiser, and as a Russian grand duchess by birth, fond, moreover, of her English relatives — she has been a particular favorite of Queen Victoria — she was treated as an enemy. On one occasion, early in the war, she was mobbed by an anti-English, anti-Russian mob in the streets of Coburg without any effort being made either by the police or the troops to protect her. The windows of her palace were smashed and she was compelled to seek refuge in one of her suburban chalets.

There she remained, to all intents and purposes a prisoner, deprived of all means of communication with her Russian and English relatives, until the overthrow of all the monarchies in Germany in November, 1918. Then her surveillance ceased. The so-called people's committee, in fact, invited her as "Frau Coburg" to continue to reside at Coburg, assuring her that she would be subjected

to no further molestation. Eventually, however, the predominance of the Socialists at Coburg determined her to take up her residence near Zurich, and she was able to withdraw thither with much of her personal possessions and her large fortune.

Sharp, of Millstream, Kings county. Rev. William Girdwood performed the ceremony in the presence of a number of friends and relatives of the bride and groom. The house was very prettily decorated for the occasion with cut flowers and the bride entered the room on the arm of her father to the strains of Lohengrin's wedding march, rendered on the piano by Miss Millie Fosythe. The bride was prettily dressed in white satin and georgette with veil and orange blossoms and carried a large bouquet of roses. After the ceremony a reception was held at which the happy pair left on a motor trip through Prince Edward Island. The bride's going away suit was navy blue French velvet with hat to match.
