13 STEAMSHIPS HANDLE SUGAR HERE THIS WEEK

Curry Some 7,500 Tons of
Raw and Refined
Product.

**MORE VESSELS ARE
ON WAY TO PORT**

Finished Product Goes to
European and United
Kingdom Markets.

This was a big week in the handling of raw and refined sugar at the Port of Saint John. The Atlantic Refinery is very busy. Already some 7,500 tons have been brought in or sent out and more vessels are on the way with raw sugar. The refined has been shipped to many United Kingdom and European ports.

Refinery Wharf
At the Refinery wharf the "Selacia" loaded 750 tons of refined sugar on Monday and Tuesday night. The "Sisto" discharged 1,466 tons of Hawaiian raw sugar on Tuesday. The "Chaudiere" discharged 800 tons of British West Indies raw sugar Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. The "Baystate" loaded 1,550 tons of refined sugar Wednesday afternoon, Wednesday night and Thursday morning. The "Anders" discharged 1,940 tons of San Domingo raw sugar on Thursday afternoon, Thursday night and Friday morning. The week at the Refinery wharf will be finished by the discharge of the "Spero" which is now due with 1,071 tons of San Domingo raw sugar.

At City Wharves
At the city wharves the "Gorn" loaded 500 tons of refined sugar for Scandinavian ports, and the "Hilde" 100 tons of refined sugar for Rotterdam. The "Brandon" (Montreal), "Canadian Mariner" (Manchester), "Canadian Mariner" (Manchester) and "Canadian Mariner" (Manchester) lifted a total of 978 tons of refined sugar for U. K. ports.

Besides the 18 steamers loading or discharging sugar cargoes for the refinery the "Polaris" is discharging at Long Wharf a cargo of 3,000 tons of coal.

In addition to all these there are due over the week end the "Hyacinthus" to load 1,080 tons of refined sugar for Montevideo, South America, and the "Bridgwater" and "Nils Finsen" bringing full cargoes of San Domingo and Cuban raw sugar.
