The ministry, he said, was divided into several sections; the ministry of character; the intellectual ministry; the ministry of power; the ministry of a positive message; the ministry that was morally in earnest, and the ministry that saw the bearing of Christ's teachings on the social problems of the time.

The world's future, he said, depended more on the church than on any government or all governments. Offi cialism, in his opinion, was the besetting sin of the ministry. Men used to care a great deal more for the cloth than they do at the present time, he said, and it was a gratifying thing that the cloth did not play so import ant a part as it did in former years, own personal character, instead of the cloth he wore. Ten houses fell in the outskirts, but only one person was killed. The walls of many houses were cracked. The whole region was severely shaken.

Naples, Oct. 21.—Mount Vesuvius is again very active. Quantities of stones were thrown out to-day, falling inside the crater. The ejection was preceded and accompanied by detonations. This is considered the most serious eruption of Mount Vesuvius since .1906.
