FEDERALS REPELLED

From their attempt to gain possession of Juarez after 8 hours fighting.

Battle to be resumed to-day and rebes expect to capture Federal general.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 25.—Sleeping on their arms under a shower of rain after their night of victorious fighting against the Federal army, 7,000 rebel troops under Francisco Villa rested this morning. The rebels expect to renew the battle to-day and hope to expture the Federal General. Jose Ynez Salasar, who, with his soldiers, is surrounded near Rancho Flores. The rebels say they are anxious to capture General Salasar so that he may be hanged to a telephone pole in Juarez.

Though the Federals were repelled from their attack to rain possession of Juarez after eight hours' fighting, General Villa believes that he must further harrass the territory north of Ohthushua City, and deliver upon them such a crushing defeat that the Federal army of Chihushua will be demoralized.

General Villa said that Federal forces are a few miles south of Samala Yuca, but with one of their troop trains, loaded with soldiers, surrounded by rebels.

The General expects the Government troops to make a sorule to-day to resone the train, and is making preparations to Saetched in a semi-circle for 15 miles, the rebel troops presents formidable battle line, and so far the Constitutionalist leader has been unable to make all detached attacks become general engagements in which the whole of his army is employed.

It is in this manner that he repelled the first onalaught of the Federals yesterday afternoon and forced them to await darkness for resumption of their main stack which Villa, through a stragetic move, turned into rout.

With camp fires burning and all signs of camp life evident at the main wing at Tierra Blanca, Villa marched his men forth to attack the Federals, Reinforements were to meet him at a specified point, from both left and right wings.

At the same moment the Federals advanced and met the combined attack of the rebels left, right and front as unexpectedly agshey themselves had planned to attack the Constitutionalists. The fight was sharp, hand-to-h Battle to be resumed to-day and rebels expect to capture Federal general.

Colonel Juan N. Medina, in command of the Juarez g.rrison, despatched every available trooper to assist the rebels on the east of Juarez.

There a battle waged flercely for five hours and the main portion of the army dropped back from its victory, additional reinforcements were sent to Rancho Fiores, and the entire Salezar Command surrounded by rebels. At midnight the fighting ceased, with Salezar and his men in the rebel trap. An attempt will be made to take Salezar into Juarez to-day. At a moment last night when the result looked grave for the Rebels and Salezar's assault upon Juarez became threatening, all Americans and foreigners were ordered out of Juarez, and under military escorts were conducted to the international bridge in El Paso. Those Americans who were dilatory about leaving Juarez were placed under arrest and forcibly ejected.

No reports were made here to indicate that American or foreigners had been subjected to any indignity other than the foreible deportation, which to Gol. Medins, seemed necessary for their protection.

Shortly after the heat of battle had passed, there came a report that Chihuahua City had fallen to the rebels, it having been almost deserted by the Federals sent to reinforce the Government troops at Salimuca. This report is yet unverified, but it is known that a strong band of Constitutionalists, under General Chao, were in the violatity of Chihuahus.

FOUGHT IN DARKNESS.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.—Two men were stabled to death and three others were probably fatality wounded late to night in a fight with silettors in a darkened room in the foreign section at this city. Frank Scarpeto, a peunty weader, is alleged to have caused the arrest of another foreigner. following a dispute to day, and to night the arrested man's friends stormed Scarpeto's room. In the melee a kerosene lamp, which had lighted the spartment, was overturned, and the battle continued in laky darkness.

In June he ascended with a passenger, at Buc, to an altitude of 16,368 ft.; a little later the same month, at Venns, made a record high flight of 15,460 Vienna, made a record high flight feet, with two passengers.
