THE RIGHT KIND OF A CHURN.—In selecting a churn, says T. D. Cartia, be sure and get large enough. It should not be more than one-third full of cream, if the easiest, most speedy and most satisfactory results are desired. Do not give too swift a motion. If you do you will prolong the time of churning, if you do not prevent it altogether. Forty or forty-five revolutions a minute is usually fast enough.
