**A NEW COLLEGE FOR DUBLIN UNIVERSITY**

(By Timothy J. O'Connor.)  
 DUBLIN, Feb. 14.—The Right Rev. Dr. Bunbury, the Protestant bishop of Limerick who did not long ago, after a few days illness will be principally remembered in the records of the public life of this country for his scathing rebuke to Mr. Long, when chief secretary for Ireland, and Lord Acton, when attorney general for Ireland, for their conduct in motoring through his diocese on Sundays to the disturbance of the worshippers in Protestant churches by the horn of the motor car whose most furious blasts were generally heard as the motor car passed by the churches at the time of service. Mr. Long whose conduct in this respect was brought under the notice of the house of commons from the Irish benches was asked across the floor of the house as to whether he would like to be furnished with a copy of the bishop's observations on the disturbances thus occasioned to the worship of his flock. He replied that he had seen the bishop's observations and he had remembered them. Dr. Bunbury who had great influence with the clergy who are voters in Trinity College was regarded by those who knew him as a political power not to be ignored. Accordingly an Irish Protestant churchman, Mr. Campbell, K. C., the present member for Trinity College, whose getting tastes indulged in on Sunday had got him into trouble with his constituents and Arthur Samuel, K. C., who pressed Mr. Campbell very hard in a contest for a parliamentary seat for Trinity later, came down "special" to read before the Irish Protestant divines of Limerick their views on the best way of spending the Sabbath which Mr. Campbell in penitence for his Sunday golf termed a day of holiness and other officials have made it apparent that the government is determined upon its course in creating a new college in Dublin University, the chief reason being urged that it will give an opportunity for bringing together the youth of the country during the hours of study.

The government proposes to build adequate buildings, laboratories and scientific apparatus. Use will, however, be made of the apparatus in the Royal College of Science, and in that way it is thought so large an expenditure of money will not be required.

The new college will be entirely free from any kind of a theological test. Its governors will be appointed in the first instance by the crown and thereafter partly by the crown and partly by the teaching staff and the graduates.

According to the plan the Royal University of Dublin will be dissolved and the University of Dublin will be turned into a national university for Ireland which will include Trinity College, Dublin, the new college in Dublin and the colleges in Belfast and Cork.

The proposals have been received with mixed feelings at Belfast and indeed throughout Ulster. Leading clerical and lay opinion, however, is inclined to the view that the new scheme is feasible although it is expected strong protests will be made against supplanting the present system so far as it permits young men to take their degrees while studying at home. No little curiosity is being evinced as to how the Roman Catholic bishops will finally act in the matter of the proposals.

Mr. William Field, M. P., has just delivered a very interesting address before the committee meeting of the Irish Cattle Traders and Stockowners' Association. During the course of his address he supplied some figures which were very striking. A summary of the official statistics showed that during the year 1906, 2,887 sheep, 3,863 cattle and 1,011 pigs were imported every day during the year. 945 sheep, 161 cattle and 42 pigs were landed in Great Britain. These figures at once give some idea of the tremendous foreign competition which those interested in the Irish cattle trade had to face. In addition Mexico was now about to send in supplies. Under present conditions Ireland could not hope to successfully compete with such ever growing foreign competition. That first essential is the estimating the prices which farmers are expected to pay for their land and the resultant annuity account should be taken of this formidable and ever increasing competition. But this was not all. It has to be taken into account that the result of this crushing foreign competition can be best encountered. The foreigners have great advantages. They have land, either rent free or at a nominal figure. The foreign trade is in many cases bounty fed. Against this the Irish farmer has the disadvantage of proximity to the market. If the transit of this country were what it ought to be this advantage would be lost. The government is determined to build adequate buildings, laboratories and scientific apparatus. **"DUMA OF VENGEANCE."**  
 Prophecy of Russian Radical Leader—Reaction and Radicalism Strong.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 14.—About two-thirds of European Russia has now chosen delegates to the Electrical College. Two-thirds of these are avowedly oppositional, while the remainder comprise Reactionaries, Conservatives and Independents, divided about equally. The votes of St. Petersburg province, which were counted today, insure that its three members in the Duma will all be Constitutional Democrats. It is evident that the city elections next week will result in the return of six opposition candidates in the capital. They will probably be four Constitutional Democrats and two Labor party.

The announcement was made today at the Constitutional Democratic headquarters here that of the twenty-six provinces where both the urban and rural primary elections are concluded, seventeen are oppositional, four doubtful and five governmental.

The Premier's brother, Alexander Stolypin, who is a prominent Octobrist, writes to the Novoe Vremya today saying that it can now be expected that the Duma will contain several Reactionaries and very many members of the Extreme Left. The weakest group will be the Moderates. He adds:—

"What chaos! It will be like the Tower of Babel. It will be a shame for Russia and a laughing stock for civilized Europe."

The temper of the Extreme Left is shown by a speech of M. Vadovost, the Radical leader, who said that the first Duma was a Duma of anger. The next will be a Duma of vengeance.

Next week Sussex will have an all night telephone service. **MURDERER ELECTROCUTED EARLY THIS MORNING**

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 15.—Fred. Caster, convicted of killing police officer Dan. Davis, who died from a Columbus residence which he had robbed, in June, 1905, was electrocuted in the annex to the Ohio penitentiary, a few minutes past midnight.

Governor Harris received many appeals for a respite for the condemned man, and shortly before he gave his final decision, not to interfere, this telegram came from Amor Caster, father of the young man, who lives at Flint, Mich.:—

"Please respite my poor boy and give him a chance to have the United States Supreme Court review his case. Two supreme court judges of Ohio dissented at first hearing. Do not send him to death without a fair chance. Have mortgaged my home and am making an effort to raise funds with every prospect of success." The governor could get no assurance from Caster's attorneys that they would appeal the case if a respite was granted.

Not reserved, may be home-stayed by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 100 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W.
