BIG INCREASE IN WAGES IN CANADA

Encouraging Report for the Last Three Months

General Prosperity is, However, Increasing the Number of Labor Disputes

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 18.—During the second quarter of the current year, comprising April, May, and June, there has been a remarkable increase in the wages in Canada. Statistics compiled by the Department of Labor show that there were 117 changes in wages for industrial groups during the period of which 104 were increases in pay.

During the months 371 accidents to workmen were reported, of which 124 caused death and 267 serious injuries. Twenty-six of the fatal accidents occurred to railway men, 14 to miners, and 19 to agriculturists.

Unfavorable weather and complications in transportation caused a heavy falling off in the number of homestead entries for the six months ending with June 30. During the half year there were 14,134 entries made, against 24,098 in the stipular period the year before.

The law providing for the deporting of criminal, indigent and insane immigrants, within two years after their arrival in Canada is to be vigorously enforced. The Canadian Immigration Department has sent out a circular to the police departments and coroners of Canada.

England will this year afford an excellent market for Canadian fruit according to a report which Trade Agents in London have received. He says that the department of trade and commerce, He says Canadian apples have achieved a record in the past few weeks.
