Atlantic Silver Salmon Ascending St. John River

Silver Beauty Now Taking the Fly - Some Fine Specimens Being Taken Daily.

Fredericton, N. B., May 19, 1932. Sportsmen who like best to take their fishing, near a first class hotel should be encouraged by reports from Hart's Island Pool and McIntosh's Bar on the St. John River, Atlantic silver salmon have been running the river for more than a week now and during that time have been rising to the fly in good style. These pools are but a few miles above Fredericton.

The spring run this year is more than a week ahead of last year's run and also precedes the run of bright salmon on the Restigouche and other rivers. To date, two of the biggest prizes have been hooked by H. G. Chesnut, veteran local angler. During two consecutive days spent at McIntosh's Bar he took two fish weighing 26 and 22 pounds respectively. Lionel Hitchman lands 30 pounder at Hart's Island Pool - Has 50 minute Battle With Largest Fish Ever Taken On Fly In Saint John River.

Fredericton, N. B., May 23. - Lionel Hitchman, veteran defence star of the Boston Bruins hockey club, well sets his name at the top of the list of anglers on the Saint John River. Fighting at Hart's Island pool, a few miles above Fredericton, Hitchman killed a 30 pound Atlantic silver salmon to set an all time weight record for salmon taken on the fly in the Saint John River. He hooked into this giant fish shortly after 2 o'clock in the afternoon and after 50 minutes of rather strenuous battling landed the salmon. Hitchman was fishing with Guide Roland Wheeler at the time. It was the second salmon that Hitchman had landed Friday, when in the morning he killed a 12 pound fish at Hart's Island pool and when some of his companions indulged in a little good natured kidding as to the size of this fish, he declared he would go back in the afternoon and "catch a record fish". He made good his prediction and in the afternoon he brought into the city the beautiful pure wool blanket, was 449.

Hitchman is spending the summer at Springhill, five miles above Fredericton and but a few hundred yards from the Hart's Island pool. With his wife and young daughter Hitchman has taken a cottage and plans to summer in New Brunswick. During the season several members of the Boston Bruins are expected to visit the veteran defence star and try their luck on the salmon pools of New Brunswick.

Donald Stillman, Rod and Gun Editor of the New York Herald Tribune, was also fishing on the Hart's Island pool Friday when Hitchman landed this record fish.

MARITIME PROVINCES MECCA FOR IMPORTANT CONVENTIONS

Moncton, N.-B., May - Several Dominion conventions will be held in the Maritime Provinces during the coming summer according to passenger traffic officials of the Canadian National Railways here.

Among these are, in Halifax, N. S., Canadian National Travelers Association, June 8-10; Dominion Association of Fire Chiefs, July 19-22; Canadian National Steamships Association, July 19-21; Knights Templar, Severn's Great Priory of Canada, August 9-10; Canadian Chamber of Commerce, September 15-16. At Saint John, N.-B., Canadian Nurses Association, June 21-25; Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants, August 24-26. At Summerside, P. E. I., Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association, July 15.

HONEYMOON COUPLES OFFERED REDUCED FARES TO B. W. I.

Honeymoon couples from now to the end of the summer season will receive a wedding present from the Canadian National Steamships in the shape of a ten per cent reduction on regular fares on sea liners westing the route from Montreal and Halifax to Bermuda, the eastern and western groups of the West Indies Islands and Demerara (British Guiana). VEGETABLE SHIPPERS

With the object of improving the quality and obtaining better markets for their produce a Vegetable Shippers' Association has been formed in Middleton, N. B., according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways. The organization will guarantee a uniform product of such crops as potatoes, carrots, parsnips and beets and by pooling individual crops to market to better advantage by shipping in carload lots. A club order is being prepared for Green Mountain potatoes and Chasney carrots to insure the members producing a uniform type of these crops.

According to information received from Louis Regamey, Canadian National Representative in Paris, Miss La France will reach Montreal on the Cunard "Aurania" on June 18 and will spend some time here.
