Ottawa, Aug. 30.—Capt. A. W. Hay, of the 8th Royal Rifles, Quebec, won the first stage of the coveted governor general's prize match at 200, 500 and 600 yards at the D. R. A. with a possible of 165 points. Putting on 21 consecutive bullseyes, said to be a world record score over the King's ranges.

This wonderful score not only places Capt. Hay in first place in the first stage of the competition but makes him high man in the grand aggregate
