SAVING CANADA SHOULD CAPTURE LARGE SHARE OF AUSTRALIAN TRADE
W. Frank Hatheyway, M. P. P., Tells Board of Trade That With Subsidized Steamship Service We Could Do Great Business With Canadian Products Direct-Gives Facts and Figures-Mr. Pender Describes Conditions in Australia and New Zealand.
An excellent address replete with most interesting statistics showing the trade of Australia and Canada's opportunities for capturing some of it, was delivered by W. Frank Hatheyway, M. P. P., before the regular quarterly meeting of the board of Commerce of Montreal and carried resolutions from both bodies.
He briefly described the geographical location of Australia and the ground covered by him. Australia's population in 1907 was 4,250,000 and Canada's in the same year was 6,500,000. Australia in the past thirty years had doubled its population while Canada had hardly kept pace with this. Ninety-six per cent of Australian people are of British origin and only four per cent outsiders. Mr. Hatheyway then submitted statistics of Australia's imports from Canada compared with the imports from the United States. The figures refer to the year 1907 and are as follows:

In all of these lines, Mr. Hatheyway thought the Canadian portion could be very largely increased. In agricultural implements and machinery there should be an especially good chance for more trade. In Melbourne he found the Messrs. James Harvey, Brown, LeBeau, Wilson & Co., of Canada, represented and doing a good business with A. P. Patterson, formerly of St. John, in charge. There should also be much room for expansion in timber as well as in metals and manufactures. The Canadian-Australia Atlantic steamship service should be made the way of aiding a growth of trade.
The method of caring for trade by the United States was shown by a special report made out by the United States Steel Company to put up a building and open an agency. They had found they could not do business with Canada and had been forced to look for a market in Australia and the Orient. Germany is also a potent factor in Australian trade as is shown by the fact that in 1907 Germany sold £443,000 worth of wire there.
Good Chance for Canada.
There was no reason why, with a subsidized steamship service, Canada could not do a great business with Canadian products direct. It was a peculiar fact that in 1907 Australia received 280,000 worth of Canadian paper, but it came from United States ports. United States manufacturers bought paper in Canada, imported it into the United States, and then exported it to Australia. If the United States could do this advantageously, then Canadian manufacturers should be able to do a fine business themselves. In fact, the Messrs. James Harvey, Brown, LeBeau, Wilson & Co. of St. John, in 1907 imported £60,000 worth of Canadian manufactured implements from the United States and the United Kingdom. Preferential trade and better steamship service would do away with the way of increasing Canada's business with the Australian confederacy. In 1907 Germany sent out furniture to the value of £20,000 and metals to the value of £1,100,000. One peculiar feature of the trade was that the Australian imports from the United Kingdom decreased £2,000,000 since 1891, while Australia's imports from all other countries had increased £2,000,000. Not Time Enough, He Says.
Mr. Hatheyway then went on to describe the congress which he and Mr. Pender attended. He did not think enough had been said on the matters discussed. Preferential trade-a question of vital importance to the whole empire-received attention for not more than eight hours during the session, and many delegates who had opinions to express upon it did not get an opportunity to speak at all. It was carried by a large majority, but the effect of the deliberations of the congress was not strong as the feeling was that many of the delegates who attended went out merely for a pleasure trip.
His own view on preferential trade was that the duty on a could very well be removed and a slight preference given. This would result in a great increase in trade through St. John.
Australia's Great Trade.
In reference to Australia's general trade, Mr. Hatheyway submitted a statistical comparison showing that its trade per head of population was greater than that of Canada. The comparison is as follows:

While in Melbourne, Mr. Hatheyway visited several stores and in every store

found goods on sale from Germany and the United States, while United Kingdom goods were underdone. He instanced a case where a large iron mangle found he could buy fives cheaper and better from United States houses than from the British firms he had been dealing with. Securing samples of American fives, he sent them to Great Britain and asked if the firm could meet the same quality or price. The reply came back: "We know what Australia wants, and we are satisfied with the business we are doing."
Mr. Pender.
Mr. Pender, who followed Mr. Hatheyway, said that one of the greatest drawbacks experienced by Canadian shippers in doing business with Australia was the lack of proper shipping facilities. It had not been satisfactory to ship via New York, and under such an arrangement Canada always got the worse of it. With a direct service there would be straight and open competition and Canada would do much more business. He then described the country in an interesting way, dwelling particularly on the great growth of farming in New Zealand. Mr. Pender, N. Z., the farmers are the aristocrats who own the automobiles and possess the largest bank accounts. In Australia and New Zealand he found little difference from the rate of wages paid in Canada, but as the workmen had an eight hour day their condition was easier.
President Estabrook expressed the thanks of the board to Mr. Hatheyway and Mr. Pender and the meeting adjourned.

Bishop Cameron.
Antigonish, N. S., April 8-Right Rev. Dr. John Cameron, Roman Catholic Bishop of Antigonish (N. S.), died suddenly tonight. He was the oldest living student of the Propaganda in Rome, and the oldest herring fisherman in America, and he was eighty-fifth year, and had been Bishop of Antigonish since 1876.
Bishop Cameron had been in fairly good health for the past few months, and he was attending to his usual duties from early morning. At 6 o'clock tonight he retired, not feeling well, but at 10 o'clock he appeared better. In a few minutes thereafter he became weak again and in an hour he died. From remarks made yesterday, it appears that the bishop had a premonition of death. The funeral will take place next week.

Sussex Suloide Likely a Lowell Mass. Man.
Lowell, Mass., April 5-The Lowell police have been asked by the Sussex (N. B.) authorities to furnish information concerning one James Ross, alias Emery, said to have committed suicide at the Royal Hotel, Sussex, Mass., 29. He is said to have been a Lowell man with a wife in St. John. The Lowell police think the man is James Emery, a cabinet maker, but his relatives are unknown.
