

Mr. R. R. DOBELL (Quebec) moved, seconded by Mr. M. ISAAC WATERMAN (London):—

"That the hearty thanks of the Dominion Board of Trade be, and they hereby are, given to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, and to the Mayor and Citizens of St. John and Fredericton, for the cordial and extreme hospitality and attention extended to the members of this Board during their visit to St. John."

Carried by acclamation.

Resolved, That this Board regards as international the interests of the Dominion and the United States as most desirable; and that the Association Councils be authorized to take steps to secure the establishment of such a rate."
