ONTARIO-MICHIGAN BASEBALL LEAGUE A REALITY NOW

The Ontario Michigan baseball League will be organized at a meeting to be held at the Bancroft Hotel in Saginaw Mich. on Saturday February

22. This statement was made by Knotty Lee of Toronto one of Canada's best known baseball impresarios and league organizers upon his return from a week's visit to numerous cities in Michigan.

Lee spent Sunday in this city and met J.W. Keenan several business men who are behind the local club in the new international circuit.
Plint Sagnia Bay City and Lansing are the four Michigan cities to be linked with London Brantford Hamilton and Kitchener in the formation of the league and taking the population of the eight cities combined will be enabled to play to over half a million people. This is more than is required for class "B" ball by the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues and assures the success of the venture with every city mentioned a live one.

The men behind the new organization in Michigan are the proper people and the game will be in better hands than in the past. Judge Clemens is at the head of affairs at Saginaw while T.H. Halligan will be the man behind the gun at Plint Judge Houghton and Messrs Eugene Fifield of the Michigan Sugar Company; T.H. Burton and McCabe are the men behind the stock company formed at Bay City to take a club in the league while C.L. Carey will have control of the club at Lansing where Slad Warner formerly manager of the Brantford club in the old Canadian League is likely to take charge of the club as Lansing is his home.

Short Railway Jumps.
The long-sought railway jump existing in the proposed organization is 215 miles between Hamilton and Lansing and compared with London to Ottawa in the old Canadian League which was over 400 miles, is much more reasonable to expect success from in financial the circuit.

Geographically situated like the London club it makes the local magnates favor the idea after reconsidering the proposition and being opposed to it in the beginning.
The reason why Kitchener is favored as the fourth Canadian city is the fact that it is so well situated with a access by street railways by four smaller towns to such an extent that a club there can draw from a population of nearly 50,000. It is also one of the greatest industrial centers in Western Ontario.

Battle Creek, Grand Rapids and Michigan interests are convinced of the feasibility of a circuit which includes the bigger cities of Ontario and Michigan and are enthusiastic over the small millage between the various cities.

The fact that the Michigan and Canadian clubs are on different days in addition to the fact that baseball in Michigan makes the league one of the most attractive in organized ball Canadian fans will, in all probability get more Saturday games while every city on the Michigan end can look forward to Sunday baseball every week.

RICKARD'S A CHECKERED CAREER

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 1.—One again George L. Rickard, one of the most widely known and at the same time one of the least known figures in American sporting circles, has proved his sporting blood by offering \$100,000 to lure Jess Willard back into the ring in a fight for the world's heavyweight championship. Rickard declares he is tackling the coming contest between Willard and a fighter as yet unnamed merely as a sporting proposition. He declares he is willing to take a chance merely as a sporting proposition, and either Jack Dempsey or George Carpentier will draw a crowd sufficient to let him out even. That such a mill is pretty certain to attract a big crowd is well-nigh beyond dispute, yet at the same time Rickard, as promoter, is taking a chance which many men of means but minus sporting proclivities would not care to take. In addition to the \$100,000 to Willard—win, lose, or draw—the promoter will be obliged to expend probably \$35,000 or \$40,000 in the erection of a suitable arena. This, with various other necessary expenses will make a total of close to \$150,000 which Rickard will have to pay out or guarantee before the fighters step into the ring.

But Rickard is what is termed in slang parlance "a game guy," and one willing to take a chance. And a strange parcel of human contradictions is this same George L. Rickard, whose experiences in various quarters of the globe would furnish material for half a hundred movie scenarios of the "thriller" variety.
His sobriquet is "Tex," though he is not a Texan. He is nearing his half-century milestone, but looks and acts a dozen years younger. Kansas City was his birthplace, but his early youth was spent in the Panhandle country of Texas, which probably accounts for his sobriquet. When still in knickerbockers he joined the boys in the cattle round-up. At the age of 10 he made his first cattle drive into Kansas.

Rickard continued his career as a cowboy until he had passed his twentieth year. Soon after he reached his majority he was elected marshal of Henrietta, Texas, which was his home town. And Henrietta was "some" town in those days and about as wild as they made them. Naturally, the young marshal had his full share of exciting experiences with two handed gun fighters, cowboys filled with "red liquor," and an occasional bad Indian.

In 1895 tales of the big finds in the Alaskan gold fields reached the ears of the young Texan and he straightaway pulled up stakes at Henrietta and started for the far North. He was one of the first big strike there. From Circle City it took Rickard and his party two months to reach Dawson, since the journey was made in the worst period of the winter and each man was obliged to pull a sled laden with six months' provisions.

It was at Dawson that "Tex" met with his first streak of big luck. He had a half interest in two claims on Bonanza Creek and sold out for close to \$50,000. With this capital he opened a saloon and gambling house at Dawson. Within a few months he was flat broke and on his way to try his luck in the new camp at Nome. By "grub staking" he succeeded in opening up an establishment in Nome similar to the one in Dawson, but this time he met with better luck. For four straight years he is said to have cleaned up \$100,000 annually.

With a comfortable fortune Rickard returned to the States to continue his adventurous career of ups and downs. Seattle and Frisco knew him for awhile, and then he found his way to the Nevada gold fields, where he is said to have increased his pile by half a dozen figures through mining and other

It is now nearly a decade since Rickard first came under the spotlight as a fight promoter. His last venture in that line was the Willard-Moran championship mill in Madison Square Garden. Between fights he has kept busy looking after his mining interests in the West or his cattle interests in South America, where he has upwards of 300,000 acres in Paraguay.
