## COAL STATION

Lake Erie Planning to Make Rond Eau a Feeding Centre For the West.

The Lake Erie R. R. are petitioning The Lake Erie R. R. are petitioning the Government for better harbor protection at Rond Eau. Their coal trade has increased so much that a better harbor is a necessity. The narrow entrance to the piers causes a better harbor is a necessity. The narrow entrance to the piers causes a bar to form across the mouth of the channel. The piers are so narrow that, in a storm, it is impossible to make the harbor. The railroad is anxious to have a breakwater built out in the lake across the mouth of the channel. Then in the case of a storm, vessels could get behind the breakwater and easily make the harbor. The Lake Erie have put in new coal docks at Erieau and a coal hoist at a cost of \$60,000. The coal docks were only completed late in the fall but the railroad got over as much coal as possible. Two schooners a week were unloaded as long as the weather lasted. During the summer the product of the mines is greatest while the consumption is lightest. The Lake Erie has great storage facilities and they desire to get over a large and they desire to get over a large coal supply during the summer so as to feed Southern Ontario during the winter, when it is almost impossible to get coal from the States.

### WHAT IS BEST?

Frincipal Paterson Consulting the Interest of Pupils and Schools in his Suggestic M to Raise Standard of Exams.

"That was a good joke my friend, Inspector Park, got off the other day," remarked the Principal of the C. C. I this morning to a Planet rep-resentative, "when he told a repor-ter of the great home journal that I could not count the seats in my own school, and cited Government statis-

school, and cited Government statistics ten years old to prove it.

"It is quite true the C. C. I. enrolment every year runs from 340 to 380, but it is just as true that the dverage attendance is from 200 to 250. The discrepancy is accounted for by the fact that the school year ends in June and begins in Sentember, so that a

discrepancy is accounted for by the fact that the school year ends in June and begins in September, so that a large number leave at midsummer, and many new pupils are enrolled in September. The seating capacity of the school is exactly 270. The number now enrolled is 260.

"With reference to the larger question of raising the standard of the entrance examinations, it has long been my conviction that it would be to the educational interests of the city and the province if perhaps twenty-five per cent of the pupils that pass the annual entrance examination had spent another year in the public schools. It would be more economical and they would be better grounded in the elementary branches, and hence better equipped to benefit from and appreciate high school work.

"When I say this, I am casting no reflections upon inspector, teachers, pupils or board of examiners. Every year we get much excellent material from both city and country, creditable alike to Inspector Park and the teachers of the inspectorate, as well as toour good Canadian stock, the brain

ers of the inspectorate, as well as to our good Canadian stock, the brain and brawn of a young and vigorous our good Canadan stock, the blatt and brawn of a young and vigorous country. But now that numbers are coming our way, and the public schools are becoming so efficient, we can afford to be more selective and need not sacrifice quality to quanti-Pupils that barely pass on a per cent. basis are, generally speaking, not good material for the C. C. I.
