Col. J. B. Rankin called up the Militia Department at Ottawa and asked them what was being done in reference to the shooting gallery and bowling alley in the basement of the new armories to be erected in Tecumseh Park. He was informed that this matter had been referred to a board of officers, and as soon as they reported, the Colonel of the 24th Kent Regiment would be notified.

President N. H. Stevens, of the Chatham Navigation Company, stated this morning that the passenger steamer City of Chatham was being thoroughly overhauled and refitted. The boat will start her regular trips to Detroit fairly early this season. It is expected, and the steamer will be in splendid shape. The officers and crew will be the same efficient persons who so ably served the public last year.

Warden John Vester was in the city Saturday. He says that out in Hawke's crops are being planted and everything is in good condition. The cold, dry weather, however, is none too good for the fall wheat, but more or less cold weather is to be expected in April, and this month is no worse than usual. County Clerk Jonas Gossnell, who was present, stated that he had seen all the winter wheat killed in April.

Sheriff Gemmill has not as yet received any definite information as to the whereabouts of Daniel Forsythe, who escaped from jail here, but is confident that he will be arrested yet. Forsythe was seen the night he escaped about four hours later, floating in northward. There was a report that he had had breakfast one morning with a farmer in Howard Township, but this report was found to be without foundation.

W. R. Phillimore, Wellington St., said that he never before appreciated the new pavements in this city as he did this spring. In other years when the frost came out of the ground there were mud holes in the streets large enough to bury an ox. This year it was a pleasure to live on the paved streets. Mr. Phillimore says that pavements are something that Chatham cannot afford to be without, no matter what the cost.

City Engineer Jones having prepared maps of the sewer system, the waterworks mains and the electric light lines and lamps in the city, is now busy on a map of the pavements in the city. The following colors are used to distinguish the different pavements:—Red, brick; blue, asphalt block; green, bitulithic; crimson, cobble stone; yellow, cressote block; yellow, blue and red, combination block and cobble stone; yellow and blue, tar macadam.
