THOUSANDS ARE IDLE. Lockouts and Strikes in New York.

New York, May 26.-It is estimated that there are close on to two hundred thousand men idle now in Greater New York, as a result of strikes and the lock-out by material men and conthe lock-out by material men and contractors. On Saturday the number of men out of work was upwards of 170,000, and to these were added today 10,000 men locked out by the material men of Brooklyn, and another 10,000 forced to lay down their tools for the want of material with which to work. Work on most of the big buildings and in the sawmills and brick yards is practically at a standstill.

ASK FOR LEGISLATION.

Resolution by Simcoe District of the Methodist Church.

A BLOODLESS DUEL.

Prince Radziwill and Count Sizzo Ex-

changed Three Shots. Paris, May 26 .- A duel with pistols vas fought to-day near Paris between Prince Radziwill, an attache of the Russian Embassy in London, and Count Edward Sizzo of Noris, an Austrian nobleman and well-known London irian nobleman and well-known London clubman. The duel was the outcome of a quarrel over cards, and Count Sizzo was the challenger. Shots were three times exchanged at fifteen paces, but neither of the duelists was injured. The principals were reconciled on the ground. Besides the four seconds, who all came from London, a doctor was the only person to witness doctor was the only person to witness the duel.

CHILD FATALLY HURST. Kicked by Horse and Caught in a Wheel.

Belleville, May 26.-A probably fatal accident happened at Mountain View, nine miles from this city, on Saturday morning last. Mr. John Ralston, his wife and little daughter were coming down the hill at the village when the circingle broke and the shafts dropped to the ground, frightening the horse, which kicked frantically, striking the little girl in the forehead. She fell to one side, and was caught in the wheel, being whirled round two or three times before her father could rescue her. When rescued she was unconscious and found to be badly injured. Doctors say the child, who is about fourteen years of age, will never recover consciousness, and may die at any moment any moment.

MRS. TAYLOR'S TRIAL BEGINS. Charged With Killing Her Husband

and Buring His Body. Monticello, N. Y., May 26 .- The trial of Mrs. Kate Taylor for the murder of her husband, Lafayette Tay-lor, at East Lake, on January 26th was begun with the drawing of a jury. The prisoner looked at each talisman searchingly, while she prompted her attorney during the examination. Mrs. Taylor is alleged to have shot her husband, chopped up the body and burned it in a stove.

Parls, May 25.—Dr. Charles Wendt of
New York shot and killed himself with
a pistol in his apartments here to-day
during a fit of temporary aberration of
mind. He went to Europe seven years
ago, was an authority on sanitation, and
devoted much time in Europe to the
study of the subject. Dr. Wendt was
associated with Dr. George F. Shrady
as an editor of The Medical Review. After going to Europe he continued to
contribute valuable papers to medical
publications in the United States. Ten
years ago Dr. Wendt wrote a book on
cholera that was accepted as an authority at the time of the scare in New York
City.

ASSAULT AND SHOCTING.

ATTEMPTED MURDER OF A YOUNG WOMAN.

ames Fram of Otonabee Township Alleged to Have Assaulted Lizzie Stewart and Then Shot Her-She is Wounded in the Legs.

Peterboro', May 26 .- Joseph Fram,

The shooting occurred about 4 o'clock in the afternoon.
