Methodism in Scotland.

Mr. Westey's labours were specially owned of God. Thousands were awakened and converted. The great evangelical revival of the last century commenced, -a revival which has spread through England, Ireland, Scotland, and the vast continent of North America, and is now rapidly extending itself throughout the world. Some of our readers, perhaps, may be surprised that we have referred to Scotland as having been brought under the influence of Methodism, as, in that country, it has generally been candidly examined the subject. We are not to judge of the success of Methodism merely by its direct effects. In some cases its direct effects may be great, while its indirect influence is small. In other cases, the indirect influence may be very extensive, while it's direct effects are limited .-The latter we conceive to be the case in Scotland.
