at the opening of the Seffion ; and I beg you to proceed, with diligence and unanimity, to the immediate confideration of the bufinels for which you are now affembled ;---and I affure you, that I will contribute every thing in my power, to accomplish a purpose so desirable.

On motion, ordered, that Mr. Hutchinfon, Mr. Robie, and Mr. Archibald, be a Committee to prepare an answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Mr. Secretary George, by order of his Excellency, delivered to the Houfe, an estimate for the support of the Civil Establishment of his Majefly's Government, alfo

An Effimate for the fervice of Roads and Bridges for the year 1810.

Ordered, That the faid Effimates do lie on the Table, to be perused by the Members of the House.

On motion, ordered, that Mr. Mortimer, Mr. Lawfon, and Mr. James, be a Committee of this House, for the purpose of examining the Public Accounts, jointly with a Committee of his Majesty's Council, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

Mr. Pyke (Quarter Master Ceneral of Militia) delivered to the House, an Account of difburfments for the carriage of Arms, between 14th June, 1808, and 16th September, 1809, amounting to £.274 15 6; and alfo,

An account of Arms and Accoutrements, purchased for and issued to the Militia,between the 30th August, 1808, and 30th September, 1809, amounting to \mathcal{L}_{11136} 2 g_{z}^{1} , and of the payments made on account of the fame. Ordered, That the faid accounts do lie on the Table to be perused by the Members of the House.

A Meffage from the Council acquainting the Houle, that they had appointed a Committee to join the Committee of this House, on the examination of the Public Accounts,

On motion, ordered, That Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Ritchie and Mr. Pearfon, be a committee to examine into and report on the expiring Laws.

Refolved, That no Petition of a private nature be received by this Houle, after the 20th inftant.

A Petition of William Sabatier and others, Merchants and Inhabitants of Halifax, was prefented by Mr. Hutchinfon, and read, fetting forth, that in confequence of the late indulgencies granted to foreigners in fupplying the Weft India Iflands, and the depression thereby occasioned to the Trade of this Province, and others his Majefty's North American Colonies, the Petitioners were appointed at a public meeting held in Halifax, a committee to folicit his Majefty's Miniflers on that fubject, and to watch over, and endeavour to promote, the general commercial interests of the community. That the Petitioners beg leave to express their well founded belief, that the prefent is the most important crifis for the Agriculture and Trade of the Province, which it has ever known, and they confidently flatter themfelves that the General Affembly, viewing the fubject in the fame light, will liberally fupport that general interest, the opportunity of promoting which to enectually, may never again return.
