Ex-Governor Sulzer Of New York State

Is Not Out Yet--Former Governor Has Opened Headquarters in a Broadway Hotel and Will Try to Re-Establish Himself.

Thaw Still Looking To Canada For Escape Route--Letter At Ottawa In Connection With The Matter

(Canadian Press Despatch) OTTAWA, Ont. Oct. 22.—Harry K. Thaw, fighting at Concord, New Hampshire, against extradition to the state of New York, which would mean his re-incarceration in Matteawan asylum as an insane criminal, still cherishes the hope of reaching sanctuary by the Canadian route.

Roche will be a refusal to supply information based on a hypothetical case. Should Thaw be restored to his freedom in the State of New Hampshire the question of his being permitted to enter Canada as a bird of passage would probably be dealt with, and Thaw apprised of the decision of the Canadian authorities.

And, accordingly he was treated as an immigrant and deported as an inmate of an insane asylum within five years of his arrival in this country.

CENTRAL WESTERN STATES REPORT BIG SNOW STORMS, CAUSING MUCH DAMAGE AND LOSS OF LIFE--NOT HEADED THISWAY

(Canadian Press Despatch) CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Central Western States to the Rocky Mountains and north to the International boundary line were storm-swept yesterday and covered with a blanket of snow following a bitter north-west wind that came with the ferocity of a mid-winter blow. In the north-west especially Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas and Northern Michigan, several deaths resulted from the chilly blast and the blinding snow.

There is absolutely no danger of the blizzard visiting Ontario, according to R. F. Stupart, of the Meteorological Observatory, who was questioned last night. Local snowfalls occurred in many parts of Ontario yesterday but the disturbance which was not connected with that in the Middle West, has now passed down to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, where the greater part of the Maritime Provinces were accompanied by north-west winds, said Mr. Stupart, "they generally pass by this part of the continent, and there need be no fear of the repeated in Ontario." The forecast for to-day promises a fine and cool day, followed at night by increasing easterly winds, with rain.

Something like a blizzard swept over the northern sections of the province early yesterday morning, however, and played havoc with the railways. In the North the conditions were particularly bad. The heavy fall of snow and the gale which accompanied it delayed all passenger traffic and completely tied up the movement of freight for some hours. Winnipeg train was over six hours late in arriving in the Toronto terminals, while all the trains from the North were behind time greatly.

SOLDIERS COMMENCING TO LOSE PATIENCE AT NANAIMO

NANAIMO, B.C., Oct. 22.—On a charge of assault in the police court before Magistrate Simpson, Lieut. Col. Hall, commanding the militia now stationed here, appeared to make a formal statement for the information of the public as to the seriousness of any interference on the part of civilians with militia on duty. He stated it was almost a daily occurrence for members of the force to be abused by insulting language. This being equivalent to seducing soldiers from their allegiance was a crime of a serious nature, with the extreme penalty of penal servitude for life.
