BIG BARN BURNED DOWN NEAR PARIS

O'Brien Farm Scene of Disastrous Blaze—News Today From Paris.

PARIS, Dec. 12.—The large barns on the O'Brien farm, immediately adjoining Paris on the north, were totally consumed by fire at 6 o'clock last night. A night-making fire short cut to his home first noticed the blaze and gave the alarm. Mr. Pascoe, who has been the tenant on the farm for a number of years, had a gang of pressers at work yesterday and nine men were just sitting down to their evening meal when the alarm was given. All turned out with a will and by herculean efforts saved nearly all the stock and machinery. One colt, some 72 chickens and a number of geese were destroyed together with all the season's crops. Mr. Pascoe carried \$20,000 insurance which will almost cover his loss. A wooden fence ran from the barn to the house and along this the fire spread rapidly. One of the men, in an effort to destroy the fence before the fire should creep to the house, was badly scorched but not seriously burned. Chickens and geese were being operated in this neighborhood for the last two weeks and as the blaze started in the chicken house it is thought that one of these geese had dropped a match, which caused the conflagration.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole holder of a homestead or any land 15 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must be a citizen or Sub-Agent for the District. Agency or proxy may be made at any time, and the homestead may be taken by another son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three consecutive years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, during the first year. A homesteader may, in certain districts, be a homesteader in section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or the adjacent six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carry homestead patent), and cultivate 60 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
