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CZERNOWITZ IS CAPTURED; VIENNA HAS ADMITTED LOSS

Capital of Bukowina, Centre of Many Railway Lines, in Hands of the Russian Army--Germans Rushing Reinforcements From French Front to Help Hard Pressed Ally in the East.

London, June 19.—After hard fighting in the suburbs and on the River Pruth, where the Austrians fought desperately with a view to gaining time for the evacuation of Czernowitz by their army and the removal of military stores, from the city, General Letehinsky has finally entered the capital of Bukowina. The capture is an important one, as it entails the command of several important railway lines. The city had been untenable for several days because of the tremendous Russian bombardment which compelled the flight of the civil inhabitants and evacuation of the place by the Austrian forces.

It is expected that further details of the capture will show that both sides suffered sanguinary losses. Comes at Dramatic Time. The capture of Czernowitz by the Russians comes at a dramatic moment, it happening only a few days after the Austrians, with imposing ceremony, had unveiled on the city hall a double-headed Austrian eagle such as the Russians had removed during their occupation of the city last year.

Russian headquarters announce the capture of Czernowitz in the usual laconic terms. It gives no description of the desperate fighting known to have occurred for the crossings of the Pruth River after the Austrians blew up the bridges, but adds the interesting fact that the Austrians are being driven into Roumania where they would be interned.

This pursuit appears to show that the Russian cavalry is still active, gaining to wonder how long the Russians can maintain the rapid advance, which must be tending to attenuate their lines of communication.

Claims Russians Held. Austrian headquarters have admitted the loss of Czernowitz, but at the same time claim that the Austrians are holding the Russians in Volhynia, and with the aid of the Germans, north of the Turya River, which is an affluent of the Pruth, joining the latter river north of Kovel.

The Russian official account makes the interesting revelation that the net strategic result of the fortnight's fighting in that the Russians hold practically a straight line between Lutsk, Buczac and Czernowitz. The military critics point out that the capture of Radiviloff, and the driving of the enemy forces to Brody and, in all likelihood, further in the direction of Lemberg, will almost inevitably compel the withdrawal of the Austrian centre from the Tarnopol region.

The Russians advancing across the Volhynian-Galician frontier are according to the latest despatches, less than 60 miles from Lemberg. The fact that Russian cavalry has been able to occupy Radiviloff shows Austrian recognition of the futility of endeavoring seriously to oppose the Russian passage of the frontier.

The recapture of the Potechka monastery causes much rejoicing among Orthodox Russians. Russians Have New Shell. Thus the forward sweep of the Russian armies continues, despite the desperate resistance of surviving Austrians and German auxiliaries, with fresh troops brought up from other fronts. In the fighting the Russians are greatly assisted by their artillery, which is equipped with a new shell which is extremely deadly in its effects. It is reported to have been invented by the scientists of various Russian universities working in collaboration.

In the north the Russians have opened a heavy and effective bombardment of the lines of von Hindenburg before Dvinsk, and it is believed in some quarters that the intense fire presages an offensive against the German armies in the north.

The Russian bombardment, Petrograd announces, has seriously damaged the German trenches and works fronting on the Dvinsk positions and southwest of Lake Narocz. Defend Stochod River. Owing to the peril which the occupation of Kovel would bring to their armies in Eastern Poland, the Germans have hurried up troops and are putting up a desperate resistance to the advance of the Russians west of the Stochod river. They are also attacking the Russians in the region of Kolkoi on the borders of the Pripiet marshes. Successes have been won over them by the advancing Russians.

In order to resist the Russian advance on Lemberg, the enemy, Russian headquarters says, strengthened by elements brought from other fronts has made furious counter-attacks at many points against the troops of General Brusiloff. West of Kolkoi, on the Sty, the enemy took the offensive near Gadoffiche village. He encountered a violent fire from the Russian artillery and his attack was repulsed.

Keeping right at the heels of the beaten enemy the Cossacks broke through his positions and captured 15 officers and over 800 men. Takes Many Prisoners. General Kaledines who is still engaged in furious fighting with the enemy on the left bank of the Sty, and in the region of the Stochod river, a marshes, where the Germans have brought up reinforcements from France, is continuing his success. In all, between June 5, and captured 83 guns, 236 machine guns, and an enormous quantity of material.

The Russian Siberian troops, under command of Gen. Kislye, captured Svidniko on the left bank of the Stochod river. The Germans left four officers and 800 prisoners in their hands. White Russian Russians brilliantly rushed through three extended lines of the enemy

and sabred two Austrian companies. The Germans then furiously attacked this village assisted by an armored train. The Cossacks, headed by Colonel Smirnov charged the oncoming engine twice in flank and captured it with their guns. They put a great number of Germans to the sword and put others to disorderly flight, taking two officers and many German cowards.

Continued Old Content. West of Stripa River in Galicia, on the road from Kremenez, the Russians in their advance drove the enemy out of Sari Movi and Potchov, as well as from the old content of Potchov, and occupied these places on Friday.

Fierce fighting is reported from the districts of Galvovonka and Kurvavonka, on the Stripa, where the Austrians are furiously attacking the Sniatnyk river. Here the Russians threw a column of Austrians back across the Tcheruivna river.

SLIGHT GAINS BY THE FRENCH

Sustain Heavy Bombardment and Advance North of Hill 321.

By Special Wire to the Courier. Paris, June 19.—The official communication issued yesterday by the war office reads: "On the left bank of the Meuse the bombardment continued against our first lines on Hill 321 and our second lines in the region of Chateauvert. "On the right bank an attack by our troops against the German positions to the north of Hill 321 enabled us to take this morning some elements of trenches and capture about thirty prisoners. In the course of the day there was violent artillery action in the sector south of Fort Vaux. "In the forest of Apremont grenade fighting occurred. Our artillery bombarded German camps and organizations at Montsec, east of St. Mihiel. "One of our long range guns shelled the station at Vigneculles-Hamochat, where a fire broke out. "Aviation: "Bar-le-Duc was bombarded again in the course of the campaign. The bombs dropped caused material damage of little importance. Several persons are reported wounded."
