Dentist Describes Crown Prince. WHAT sort of man is the Crown Prince of Germany, "out whom so many different stories have been told?" Dr. A. N. Davis, the American dentist who lived for several years in Berlin at the Crown Prince's court, was not favorably impressed by him. One would gain from Dr. Davis' remarks that the Crown Prince's statement made not long ago, the effect that he was no fire-eater, was probably truthful, although the popular theory has been that the Crown Prince was the pal leader of the war party in Germany, and that he was the spokesman of this party forced the Kaiser's hand in July and August, 1914. Dr. Davis' idea of the prince was that he was something of a "sissy" more interested in jewelry and the latest clothes than in the war. Nor did the dentist subscribe to the theory that the Crown Prince personally is a brave man. Of course, it is probably true that the bravery that is displayed in a dentist's chair is every a rarer quality than the "two o'clock in the morning courage" that a general leads.

The first time the dentist and the Crown Prince met was in 1905, when the young man came to have his teeth fixed. It was a most unsatisfactory patient, for as he sat in the chair he trembled violently and was so fearful of the slightest pain that he never found it almost impossible to do the necessary work. He was exquisitely dressed, and had a habit of placing his hands on his hips, and he was wearing a most satisfactory appearance that was unusual with German officers. On this first visit he carried a copy of Life containing a cartoon which depicted his vanity, though it is difficult to believe that at any time the New York humorous paper ever presented the Crown Prince and any other role that that of ass or knave. He had two beautiful rings on his left hand and wore a wrist-watch. At that time the dentist was considerably impressed by the prince's appearance. He took great pride in his own slim figure, and told Dr. Davis that he loathed fat people, and that he ate very little in order to remain thin.

The Crown Prince would make an appointment for \$30, but would call up at 10 to say that he would be there at 11, and then turn up sharp at noon. He had a tremendous love of the limelight, and was frequently stopping his horse or his car to give a coin to a child or an amusingly professional-looking beggar. This, Dr. Davis thought, was merely ostentation, but he recalled that an English woman who traveled with the Crown Prince on his trip to the East Indies on a hunting expedition some years ago, was impressed by his love of children, and his almost fatherly interest in the children of the Crown Prince was the despair of the policemen of Berlin, as were his brothers. He drove at a reckless pace, and usually at the wrong side of the street. On one occasion his car was wrecked, but as bad luck would have it he escaped injury. On one occasion he rode his horse up to the hundred steps of the palace at Sans Souci, not a difficult feat, but one that was extravagantly advertised in the obsequious German press.

Dr. Davis saw him once driving up Unter Den Linden, but hearing the familiar sound of the Kaiser's car behind, he drew up to the side of the road and hid until it had passed, not daring to precede his father. When the Crown Prince visited the dentist after the war broke out in France he noted that he looked much older than his years. His conversation was as flippancy as ever and was full of hideous speculations as to the good time the men were having at home with the millions of German manhood at the front. He asked the dentist if he saw many good-looking girls in Berlin, and he was interested in the subject that was deplorable in a married man. Dr. Davis said that criticism of the Crown Prince's behaviour with regard to the women of his own character who visited his headquarters was quite general. His own officers complained that he was setting a bad example, and that he had few opportunities of following. He was not considered a military expert by those in the inner circles, but the newspapers had an opportunity of revealing his character as a general. On this occasion he had new rings which he took great delight in looking at. He spoke about a new car he was driving, and which he had just showed off a new raincoat to a number of royal and semi-royal ladies who had assembled in the dentist's waiting room to wait for him. The war he considered "a lot of damned nonsense." He spoke of his men at the western front standing in mud and water up to their knees as though it were rather a humorous situation. "We've been having a lot of fun pumping the water from our trenches into the French trenches," he said, and the dentist remarked, "Well, I suppose they pump it right back, don't they?" to which he replied, "You're quite right, quite right. That's exactly what they do. Really, it's a great lark." His conversation upon the war was of a jejune character, and it was plain enough that he was not interested in the war at all. He spoke unconcernedly of two million Germans growing up who would furnish reserves for the German army, and he expressed the wish that the fighting were over, if this conversation took place after Verdun.
