This committee was named by the chair as follows: Messrs. Palmer, Anthony, Chisholm, McDonald, Congdon, Barwell, McMullen, McCauley, Matheson, Donaghy, Vachon, Binet, Norquay, Bethune, Milne.

The committee as above named held a meeting at the office of Clarke & Wilson today and after a number of ballots placed in nomination a ticket as indicated above.

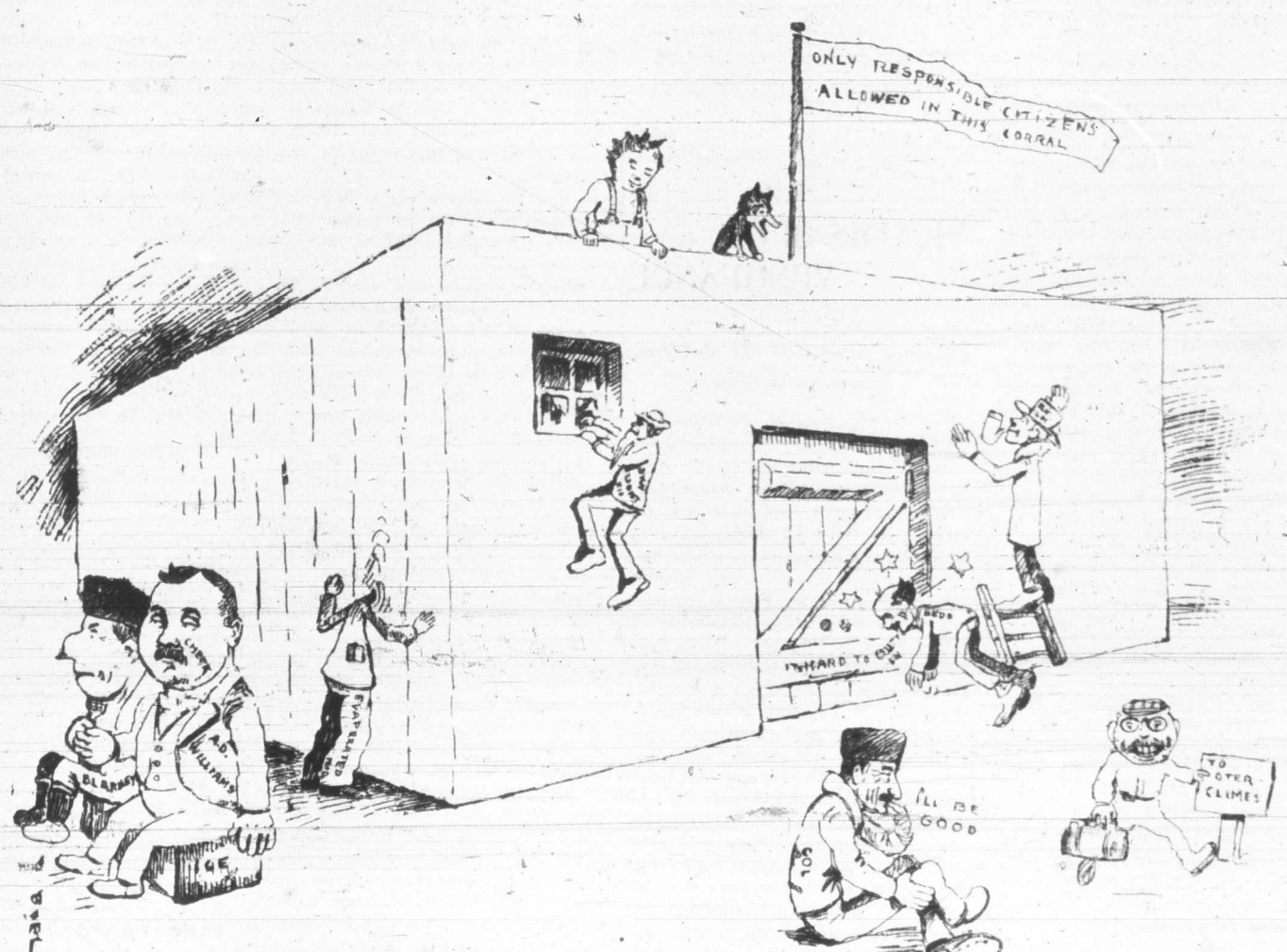

SENTENCE SUSPENDED

Fowle, the Young Man Who Attempted Suicide, Released.

Territorial court convened this morning in order to hear the arraignment and election of several prisoners bound over for trial from the lower court. Harry M. Fowle charged with having attempted to commit suicide who several days ago pleaded guilty to the indictment, asked leave to change his plea to one of guilty upon doing so Mr. Justice Dugas allowed him his liberty on suspended sentence.

Wm. R. Brandon at the time of his arraignment elected to be tried before a jury. He has now withdrawn such election and will be tried before the judge alone, his case being set for a hearing next Tuesday at 11 o'clock.

George Grule charged with having stolen \$59 from Frederick Patterson and one Maccauley at the Beef Café road house on December 27 plead not guilty. The amount involved in the offense being less than \$100 the prisoner will be tried before the judge alone next Tuesday.

It is thought the case against Jacob Saltman will also be heard on the same date.

Owing to Fowle's change of plea and also the election of Brandon, the necessity of a jury does not arise and none will be present at the sittings of the court next week.

CANADA'S FINANCES

Mighty Increase in Customs Receipts for Year Ending December 31st.

FOREIGN TRADE WAS \$213,231,609. An Addition of Over \$13,000,000 to Previous Year's Amount.

PARLIMENT NOT SUMMONED

But Will No Doubt Be Called to Meet on February 13th—Date to Be Fixed Soon.

Ottawa, Jan. 11, via Skagway. Jan. 16.—The customs department has given out today the trade figures for the last six months of the year ending December, 1901.

A statement of revenue and expenditure for six months of the present fiscal year which ended on the 31st day of December last was issued today by the finance department.

The cabinet did not touch on the question of summoning parliament yesterday, that will be decided early next week. However, there is little doubt that February 13th will be named for the meeting of the House.

CANAL BILL PASSED
