MANY ARE CELEBRATING

A Large Colored Demonstration
Being Held in the
Maple City To-day.

Delegations Present From De-
troit, Ypsilanti and all of the
the Neighboring Towns.

The First of August, the day which
is eagerly looked forward to each
year by the colored people of Chat-
ham and vicinity, is being duly cele-
brated in the Maple City today.
Each train this morning brought in
a host of new arrivals until the city
is overflowing with members of the
colored race, celebrating the anniversary
of the day that their forefathers
were relieved from the bonds of
slavery.

The celebration is, without excep-
tion, the most successful held in the
Maple City. The committee who have
the matter in hand are John Brown-
ing, Robert Doleman, J. Sephis, David
Lee, Geo. Smith, J. Brown, J. John-
son, W. Branton, W. Williams and
J. Jackson. These men are giving
credit for the way they have handled
the celebration and the success they
have made.

The western delegation from De-
troit and Ypsilanti were met at the
G. T. B. station at noon and a pro-
cession was immediately formed,
headed by the Lincoln club brass
band of Ypsilanti, and the Detroit
Colored brass band. The proces-
sion ended up at the drill shed, where
dinner was served for the visitors.
After dinner the bands marched
down to the boat to meet another
delegation from Detroit and con-
ducted them to the park, where a
program of speeches was given.
Mayor Sulman acting as chairman.
Among the speakers were Geo.
Stephens, M. P. H. Stevens, M.
Houston, T. L. Fardo, R. L. S.
White, and Rev. Mr. Henderson, B.
A. A baseball game between the
colored teams of Buxton and Chat-
ham is also in progress this after-
noon.

The celebration will be concluded
by a grand banquet and cake walk
in the drill shed to-night, when a
gold medal will be given to the best
dressed lady. A platform has been
erected in the hall for the orchestra
and an excellent time is anticipated.
T. S. Gains, of Detroit, who is act-
ing as general conductor of the
grand event, in conversation with
The Planet, said:

"I would like you to announce that
a general invitation is extended to all
people of color, as well as the mem-
bers of the colored race, to attend our
banquet and dance to-night. It is
their celebration as well as ours.
This day was made for the colored
people and we don't want to miss
it. The day that we all turn out and
have a good old time and then get
down to business for another year.
I am glad to see that our celebra-
tions are getting more refined every
year. In olden times it was the custom
for the people to gather around hotels
and have their time, but now they
are getting more educated and you
see the result, as he smilingly nod-
ded around at the happy group who
were chatting together and enjoy-
ing themselves in the drill shed.

"We have lots of celebrations in
the States, but they are not like the
ones here. There the white people
celebrate because they have to, but
here it is free and open. This year
we decided to have a joint celebra-
tion with our friends in Chatham
and have an old time of it and
we are having it." And the
aged conductor enjoyed a hearty
laugh and walked away to attend to
his duties.

LOCAL LEGAL

Before Meredith C. J., C. P., and Mac-
Mahon, J.

Middleton vs. Scott—Judgment (H)
on appeal by plaintiffs from judgment
of Street, J., 60 O. L. R. 27, allowing
defendant's appeal from report of lo-
cal master at Chatham, to whom this
action for redemption of mortgaged
lands had been referred by the trial
judge, and cross-appeal by defendant
(mortgagee), from so much of the said
judgment as precludes defendant from
having the costs of the action, and also
on the ground that Street, J., errone-
ously construed the mortgage in ques-
tion so as to deprive the mortgagee
of interest post date, as therein stipu-
lated for. Counsel for plaintiff con-
tended that the conduct of defendant's
solicitor in claiming from plaintiff
\$5.13 in connection with some alleged
proceedings under the power of sale
in the mortgage, in addition to the
principal and interest, amounted to a
disposition with the tender of prin-
cipal and interest to the agent and so-
licitor of defendant. Ex parte Birch,
22 L. J. N. S. Bank, at p. 75; Jones
v. Tarleton 9 M. & W. 675; Kerford v.
Mondel, 20 L. J. Ex. 303; Lide v. Mor-
gan, 23 O. C. C. P. 517; Robbins on
Mortgages, pp. 710-1; and Fisher on
Mortgages, p. 1503, referred to. Held
that there is nothing in the evidence
or correspondence that would warrant
the view that a tender of the prin-
cipal and interest was dispensed with,
and that the solicitor's claim for \$5.13
on the cost of the alleged proceedings un-
der the power of sale could by no pos-
sibility dispense with a tender of the
amount due on the mortgage, and
that, there being no tender and no dis-
position with a tender the interest
continues to run.

Held, also, that, although by para-
graph 8 of the judgment of the trial
judge the Master is directed to report
specially his findings on all matters
relating to the alleged tenders or ex-
cuses for tenders, and to any matters
affecting the question of costs, since
the question of costs is not reserved
to be afterwards dealt with, this di-
rection is an inconsequential and use-
less one, and, in any case, insufficient
to control the direction contained in
paragraph 4, to tax costs, and the pro-

vision of rule 756, that they shall be
taxed to defendant, and that therefore
Street, J.'s view that the costs of the
action, except in the event mentioned
in paragraph 7, are not dealt with, is
erroneous, and that under the terms of
the judgment in the event that has
been appealed the defendant is entitled to
the costs of the action. Held, also, that
the provision in the mortgage that in-
terest is to be paid at the rate of 8
per cent. per annum after maturity
means after the principal money has
become payable, that is to say, after
the expiration of the five years as well
as before, and that, in that view of its
meaning there is no room for the ap-
plication of the principle applied in
such cases as People's L. & D. Co. v.
Grant, 18 S. C. R. 262; such a con-
struction of the proviso for redemp-
tion being here excluded by the pro-
vision that interest at 8 per cent. is to
be paid after the maturity of the
principal sum—in other words, after
the principal sum has, according to
the terms of the proviso become pay-
able. Plaintiff's appeal dismissed with
costs and defendant's cross-appeal al-
lowed with costs, and judgment of
Street, J., varied by directing interest
on the whole \$324 to be calculated at
the rate of 8 per cent. per annum and the
defendant's costs of the action to be
added to the principal and interest. M.

HELD UP

Member for North Essex Con-
fronted by Burglar With
Loaded Pistol.

Windsor, Ont., July 31.—Mr. R. F.
Sutherland, K. C., member of Parlia-
ment for North Essex, had an exciting
experience with a burglar at an early
hour this morning. He was awakened
by a noise downstairs, and when he
attempted to investigate, found him-
self looking into the muzzle of a big
revolver in the hands of a early
morning visitor. When he saw
that Sutherland was unarmed the
burglar ordered him to retire, upon
pain of being filled full of holes.

had made good his escape to the other
side of the river, presumably upon one
of the big ferries which run all
night. Detroit detectives arrested
the man later in the day, and brought
him to Windsor where he is now locked
up under the name of Darby Travers.

response to a communication from St.
Thomas, saying that a quantity of sil-
ver had been stolen there. The silver

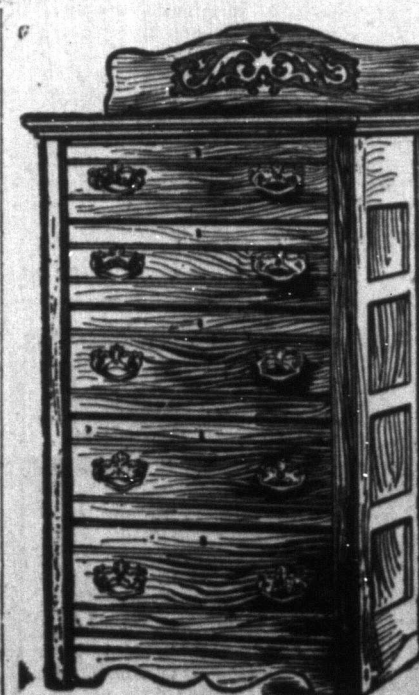
