

French-Canadian Business Men Through the Archbishop.

Montreal, Sept. 2.—Yesterday, after a call at the flower show, the Archbishop of Canterbury, accompanied by J. Pierpont Morgan, Sir George Drummond, Bishop Carmichael, President George E. Drummond of the Board of Trade and others paid a short visit to the Bank of Montreal, where they were received by General Manager Clouston. There the most interesting incident of the day took place.

His Grace arrived in the Chambre de Commerce, where the leading French-Canadian business men had gathered. These Roman Catholic gentlemen delighted the head of the Church of England with the following address, read by President H. A. A. Brault: "The Chambre de Commerce is happy to unite with your flock and the citizens of Canada to tender to Your Grace our profound respects and our most, sincere thanks for the honor of a well-appreciated visit to our chambre. Will Your Grace allow me to say that although we French-Canadians do not though we remember the leieve though we French-Canadians do not though we French-Canadians do not belong to your own faith, we believe in the one God, who wishes all His people to live in peace. You well understand His command and the hroadness of your mind, of which you have given proofs, not later than a few days ago, when, in Quebec, you extolled the virtues and heroism of our missionaries, as well as those of the men of your own race. "If you will stop to consider, there has been a lot of building going on in Chatham this year and all of this building has been going on in the heart of the city, on paved streets, whereas formerly the building was chiefly on the outskirts of the city and on unpaved streets. This will increase the assessment next year, and the higher the assessments the smaller the rate will be. Eighteen new houses have been put up between the C. P. R. track, and the Grand Trunk track on Queen St., and for all of these improvements to the city there will be no expense to the city for the extension of sidewalks and sewers to them. The city is commencing to fill in with buildings and becoming more compact.

"I understand that Larry Howard is going to put up a number of houses on the Stone property on Queen St., facing Patterson avenue. That will mean more assessment. About 75 new houses have gone up this year and all are good buildings.

"Then, for the last 15 years the city has been piling up debentures and paying the interest on them and none of them have matured. One of them matures next year and two the year after, and from this on some of them will be maturing every year. So that the new debentures that we will add in the coming years will not increase the debenture debt, as for each one added an old one will mature, and so we can go on adding improvements to our city and not increase the taxes at all.

How the Oldest Highland Regiment Obtained Its Name - A Unique and Interesting History

No historical narrative makes more interesting reading or more inspiring to the heart of every Britisher than the story of the Black Watch and its splendid roll of victoreis. The origin of this most attractive name is of great interest. In 1725 a number of Highland gentlemen volunteered for the service of the Crown to preserve order in the Highlands and for years later these loyal Highlanders were constituted as a part of the domestic military force of Scotland. At that time six independent companies were formed numbering 525 men and the officers were all leading Highland. At the officers were all leading Highland Chieftans.

These independent companies wore the clan tartan, consisting mostly of of the black, blue and green of their respective commanders, and from sombre appearance they were disignated "Am Freiceadan Dubh" or "Black Watch" to distinguish them from the regular troops, who were called "Saighdearan Dearg" or "Red soldiers" on account of the prevailing color of their uniforms. The private men of the "Black Watch" were provided with muskets and bayonets, and besides these weapons each Highlander had his broadsword, target, pistols and dirk. The sergeants carried the Tuagh or Lochaber axe. As the operations of these companies were confined to their own terfitories, they enlisted the services of the members of many distinguished families.
