International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Death of John the Baptist—14, 1-12.

Golden Text—"Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life."

This prophet, yea and more than a prophet—for among them all there had not arisen a greater than John the Baptist—was suddenly transferred from the free and successful work of God in the wilderness to the darkness of the prison as Herod's prisoner. This man, fasting yet God-defying Jewish ruler, this slave of sin had been reproved by John as an adulterer, living with his brother's wife; she a second Jezebel, feared the prophet's warnings would effect her dismissal, watched her opportunity. It came on Herod's birthday feast of drink and revelry, wine and women; 'twas to be a death day to the man of God. There were seven Herods; they were all a bad lot, and this one of our lesson one of the worst. See his treatment of John and Jesus in the judgment, hall—Luke 23, 11-12. Other men spoke soft and smoothly to Herod; not so John, whose reproof struck like a burr in his guilty conscience. Herodias' daughter's dance was a devil's trap—as many dances are which crowd our opera houses to-day—it lured Herod on to become a murderer. "After the ball was over," with promise of reward the girl flies to her mother for advice; no other reward so sweet to this guilty woman's revenge as her accuser's gory head received from her daughter's hand.

Like many, Herod's sin grieves him, but he never grieves truly for his sin. John's work was soon done and well done, and although disappointed in a Messiahian Kingdom he was translated from a prison cell to the Kingdom of Glory to die was gain. His disciples bury their master and go to tell Jesus.

"Art thou weary, art thou heavy hearted? tell it to Jesus." The loss of anyone, or anything, or life itself, God can make it a great gain.

### BATTLE FOR LIFE

The Wade Park Zoological Gardens of Cleveland, O., were the scene of a most exciting conflict not long ago. Among the birds, beasts and reptiles that comprise the collection, none is more widely known, nor by its attendants more feared, than the giant African ostrich, and with this great bird the superintendent of the gardens, Mr. Arthur Spencer, had a most exciting battle for life in the presence of several attendants, who terrified to render their chief every much aid. The following is Mr. Spencer's own story of his struggle for life:

"It had always been customary for attendants to enclose the ostrich in a large enclosure—whenever it became necessary to clean the large enclosure—which, from the awe in which the bird was held, was not very often. However, upon my taking charge I saw no good reason why the ostrich should be exempt from the rules governing the rest of the zoo. So after listening to all the tales of the fierce, ungovernable temper of this particular bird, I made preparations to invade his stronghold.

"I have always found in handling a single ostrich that the most successful weapon of defence is the ordinary garden rake, supplemented with a whip. In making an attack an enraged ostrich makes such quick rushes that it is well-nigh impossible to stop him with an ordinary weapon, but with the garden rake, if instead of waiting for his onslaught, one advances toward him, and before he gets his full momentum of speed forces the rake against his neck, just below his head, he will instantly turn tail and run. Then if followed closely with a good stout whip, applied vigorously, he speedily succumbs.

"I had barely entered the cage and closed the gate when the ostrich eyed me. For a moment he seemed as if he could not fully realize that some person had at last had the temerity to invade his domain. Then, seemingly having made up his mind and what to do, he started toward me. I quickly advanced to meet him, and just as he was preparing for his grand rush I reached him, brought my rake to bear against his neck, but only for a foot, when he turned quickly for about twenty feet. Then he turned quickly again, and before I realized it he was coming toward me with the speed of whirlwind.

"I raised my rake, but he jumped high in the air, and as he descended close beside me, struck me with both feet, knocking me into a corner of the pen; then while I lay prostrate he tried to kick me to death.

"The fact that I lay in the corner of the pen alone prevented his accomplishing his purpose. He would raise his foot high in the air, then kick downward like lightning. His feet would inflict the most severe cuts and bruises, and tear my clothes in shreds; but owing to my position in the corner, I was able by quick dodging, to save myself severe injury. The most painful wound being a gash in the hip four inches in length and about three inches deep.

"I saw that I must get at once, before I was seriously injured, and as my only only weapon, the whip and rake, were some ten feet away, I knew I must take great chances in securing them. In the meantime the attendants were grouped outside the cage, too terrified to render me any assistance. I called to them to open the gate and throw something at the ostrich to attract his attention. They finally did.

"I lay perfectly still, and after several more kicks at my prostrate form the ostrich, with a shriek of defiance, made a dart for the gate. As he did
