The Forrest Milk Condensing Company, of Kingston, are making 170 to 200 lbs. of butter every day, which they ship in air-tight 5 lb. cans to the West Indies. The butter gets 22c. clear of all expense. The waste is utilized for feeding hogs at the factory. They are also condensing milk and coffee.

Chas. Donovan, 16 years old, son of W. H. Donovan, proprietor of the Halifax mineral works, died Friday morning, the result of a bicycle accident which occurred on Monday. Young Donovan was thrown from his wheel, his foot caught in the wire spoke and he fell head first and was badly injured internally.

Mr. L. W. Sleep has purchased the homestead property and is putting it in thorough repair for his own residence. The dwelling is probably the oldest in Wolfville, and is said to have been built about 150 years ago. It is being completely renovated, both internally and externally, and will be very much changed in appearance.

The immense furnaces require to be without fire for nearly four weeks in order to cool off so that men can work about them.
