GENERAL NEWS.

Over eight thousand dozen eggs were shipped to Boston last week from Annapolis, N. S.

Jews have been so persecuted in Limerick lately that numbers have left that city.

Hamm and Homer are to row in the annual regatta on the Charles River, Boston, to-morrow.

The corner stone of the new Custom House and Post Office at Windsor, N. S., was laid last week with music and ceremonies.

Eleven persons were poisoned at Coal Bluff, Pa., a few days ago by eating ice cream supposed to have been poisoned by vanilla flavoring. Several of the party have died.

The new Cunard line steamer "Unbia" was launched in London last week. The tonnage is 8,000 and her engines the most powerful in the world, being 12,500.

Representatives of Ross and Tegner have verbally agreed that the men shall row a three mile race for \$1,000 a side at Oak Point during the first week in August.

The inhabitants of Southern Minnesota are constructing "cyclone cellars," which are usually a deep vault connected with the ordinary cellar, but not under the same roof, and separate passage leading to the surface.

A large tract of valuable land in South Carolina, owned by over one thousand persons, is being sold by some of the original grantees dating back to 1780. They are instituting proceedings to establish their claim.

A handsome granite monument in the form of a Scotch cross 15 feet in height, has been erected in Duthie Park, at Aberdeen, to commemorate the gallant conduct of the Highlanders in the Egyptian campaign.

There are sixty Catholic churches in Montreal. The French Cathedral situated there, is the largest church building on this continent. It is built of limestone, and 15,000 people have often been assembled under its roof.

The steamship "Great Eastern," which is being built by Messrs. Harland and Wolff at Belfast, is being chartered by T. Frank Warren and others who will fit up the ship as a hotel, to be anchored near the exhibition grounds.
