ACCIDENT ON C. P. R.

Immigrant Special Wrecked and Nine Passengers Injured, Two Severely.

The Accident Occurred Near Megantic and the Cause Not Yet Ascertained.

INJURED TAKEN TO MEGANTIC HOTEL.

The immigrant special over the C. P. R., consisting of ten cars and containing the passengers from the Carthagenian, and which left St. John at six o'clock yesterday morning, was wrecked yesterday afternoon at 4:45, a mile from Boundary, which is a short distance this side of Megantic. Two immigrants on the train suffered severe injuries and seven others were more or less hurt.

The cause of the accident is not yet known, but it is thought probably the result of a broken rail or a brake beam falling on the track. The baggage cars and two coaches were derailed. The derailed coaches were crowded with immigrants, and it was particularly fortunate that the list of injured was so small.

The two men most seriously hurt were George French, a native of Yorkshire, who received a compound fracture of his leg, and Herbert Hughes, a Welshman, who suffered a compound fracture of the arm. These two men were taken along at once to the hospital at Sherbrooke.

The seven others were not badly injured and were taken to the hotel at Megantic and will go forward on the immigrant special when the tracks are cleared again, some time early this morning.

The train at the time of the accident was in charge of Conductor Vickers of Brownville, Engineer Carney, also of Brownville, was in command of the engine.

NORTH ATLANTIC TRADING CO.

The Cancellation of Contract Will Not Effect Emigration.

Steamship People Say the Reverse Will Happen.

Witnesses Who Have Been Summoned to Appear Before Committee.

MONTREAL, May 4.—A special London cable says: The committee of the Canadian common law has summoned Alfred Jury, of Liverpool, agent of the government, to attend at Ottawa forthwith to give evidence respecting the North Atlantic Trading Company. There is a touch of piquancy in the circumstance that Mr. Preston and Mr. Griffith, of the Canadian office, will sail in the same boat, the Empress of Britain, tomorrow.

Inquiry today among authoritative steamship people elicits the belief that the cancellation of the trading company's contract will have no deterrent effect whatever upon continental emigration to Canada. Indeed, it, as has been alleged, the Canadian government bonus has not hitherto found its way to the actual booking agents, who do a greater part of the promotion work, the new arrangement, whereby, presumably, agents will really get the bonus, is likely greatly to stimulate their desire to send immigrants to Canada instead of the United States or to South America.

These authorities say the most potent influence in the recent increase in continental emigration to Canada has been, not the operation of the North Atlantic Trading Company, but a compact among steamship companies whereby agents must book Canadian emigrants by Canadian and not by New York or other American steamers.

NARROW ESCAPE

Woodstock Boys Drifted Down River on Catamaran and Rescued After Hard Experience.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., May 4.—Two boys of this town had a narrow escape from drowning this evening. Clyde Camber and Perley Hartley got on a catamaran at the shore near town. The catamaran got out into the swift water and made a rush for the current. They had no way of controlling the craft, which rushed down the river for a mile and a half, when it struck a boom, and Camber managed to climb on the boom and get ashore. Hartley caught on the boom, but had not strength to pull himself up and got out of the water. Two lucky lads, Fred Clark and Tom Gable, got into a canoe and made down river. Fortunately they got to the boom in time to pull Hartley into the canoe. He was then on the eve of exhaustion, and half a minute later would have been too late. Neither boy is any the worse for the accident. Great credit is due to the timely heroism of the young rescuers, who were in considerable danger themselves of being upset by the raging water in their frail craft.

THE PHILIPPINES.

United States Finds Plenty of Work in Quelling Rebellions.

MANILA, May 5.—Governor Sandiko of Bulacan Province threatens a concentration unless the people assist him to capture fanatical Ladrone. Senator Sandiko is the first native governor to recommend reconcentration.

Brig. General Buchanan yesterday telegraphed from Lolo that he had returned from an expedition against the Pulajanes, killing several and destroying the headquarters. The Pulajanes escaped.

FATAL RAILWAY COLLISION.

Several Persons Killed and Many More Injured

In a Head-On Collision on Pennsylvania Railway.

Both Fast Trains Were at Full Speed When Crash Came.

ALTOONA, Pa., May 5.—The most disastrous accident on the Pennsylvania Railway since the disaster at Harrisburg nearly a year ago, when about twenty persons were killed, occurred last night about ten o'clock on the Petersburg Branch, about one hundred yards east of Clover Creek Junction. The Chicago mail, bound east, and the St. Louis express, bound west, two of the fastest trains on the system, going at full speed, met head-on. Seven cars were wrecked and both engines badly damaged. The best information obtainable is to the effect that seven persons were killed and twenty injured. The particulars may change as these figures, but not to any extent.
