The Elections.

Two victories for the Liberal Conservatives were secured last week by the election of Sir Charles Tupper for Cretion by the splendid majority of 827 over his opponent on Tuesday, Feb. 4th, and the election on Thursday of Mr. James Robinson by a majority of 433 over his opponent, Hon. Peter Mitchell.

Monday was Declaration Day and the official returns are as follows—

For the purpose of showing how close the vote was that of the general election of 1891 between Messrs. Adams and Mitchell we give the returns of that election—

Adams' majority 473.

A majority of 433 for Mr. Robinson having been recorded the sheriff declared Mr. Robinson elected to represent Northumberland in the Dominion Parliament.

The deposits were then returned to the agents, and the sheriff declared the court closed.

Calls for Mr. Robinson were then made, who addressed them for a short time, thanking the electors for the honor done him by electing him by so large a majority.

He said he lacked words in which to express all he felt, but he would work for Northumberland's best interests. They now had three representatives, two in the senate and one in the House of Commons and he thought they ought to be able to look after the interests of the county.

He thanked those who had voted for him as well as those who had canvassed the county in the interests of the great Liberal and Conservative Party. He had done their part and now he would do his. As a young man he felt the responsibility of the position he had elected him to and he would endeavor to deserve their confidence.

(Local Applause.) Mr. Mitchell upon taking the platform was greeted with applause. He said he had listened with much satisfaction to that part

The Prohibition Convention.

The indications are that the Prohibition Convention to be held in Fredericton next week, (11th and 20th), will be attended by a number representing every section of the province.

The Convention will be held in the Temperance Hall, York St. The hall will be open at 10 a. m. on Wednesday and all members who are in the city that morning are requested to meet at the hall for an informal conference.

The first regular meeting will open at 2 p. m., Wednesday, at which time the Convention will be duly organized by the election of officers, the appointment of committees, &c.

Wednesday evening there will be a Welcome meeting, which will be addressed by several speakers.

On Thursday there will be three meetings, the closing meeting of the Convention being held Thursday evening. Mr. F. S. Rogers of Toronto, will be present throughout the Convention. All phases of the prohibition question are likely to receive consideration at the Convention.

Every meeting will be of interest and who who intends to be present will be from the opening to the closing meeting of the Convention.

It is unfortunate that the dates appointed for the meeting conflict with the meeting of the Orange Grand Lodge, and which will prevent many prominent temperance men who are also connected with the Orange body from being present at the Convention of Prohibitionists, which might just as well have been held a week or two later, and result in a larger if not a more representative attendance.
