MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

A Large Meeting of Clergy-
men Here Tuesday
March 27th.

DELEGATES APPOINTED.

Dalhousie Junction To Have A
Student For Summer—
Call to Mr. Rainie.

The Presbytery of Miramichi held its quarterly meeting in the hall of St. James Church, Newcastle, on Tuesday. The Moderator, Rev. J. W. Wheeler, was in the chair. The ministers present were—Rev. Dr. Carr, Rev. J. M. McLeod, Rev. D. Henderson, Rev. J. M. McLean, Rev. J. F. McCurdy, Rev. A. D. Archibald, Rev. A. D. Fraser, Rev. H. Arnott, Rev. J. R. McKay, Rev. J. G. A. Coughlan, Rev. M. J. McPherson, Rev. B. Stacey, Rev. J. A. Kirk, Rev. H. Kent, Rev. J. S. Scott, Rev. S. Mitchell, Rev. James Ross, Superintendent of Home Missions, and Messrs. George Dickson, H. Lamont, John Henderson, John Sinclair, W. Carruthers, elders.

Rev. J. M. McLeod and Rev. E. Thompson were associated with the Presbytery. Commissioners to the General Assembly, which meets in Lennox, Ont., in June were appointed as follows—Rev. R. S. McPherson, Rev. D. Henderson, Rev. W. M. Townsend, Rev. J. R. McKay, ministers; and Messrs. Baird, Dunn Henderson, and McNicol, elders. Rev. Dr. F. Jones, Pecon, N. S., was nominated for the moderatorship of the assembly.

Rev. J. M. McLeod, H. Arnott and A. D. Archibald were appointed a committee to nominate the Presbytery's representatives in the assembly's Standing Committees. Rev. D. Henderson, Convenor of the Home Mission Committee, drew attention to the large territory embraced by the congregations of Tabusintac, Black River and Dalhousie, and stated that the minister of one of these congregations, Rev. J. R. McKay, sometimes drove sixty miles and preached three times on a Sunday. He suggested the appointment of students to assist the ministers of these three congregations, respectively, for the summer months. Rev. James Ross warmly approved of the idea. The matter was discussed by the Presbytery, and after careful consideration the appointment of a student to Dalhousie Junction was approved, and the other two fields were referred to the Superintendent and the Home Mission Committee with power to issue the matter. Application for catechists for the summer was made on behalf of Miscon, Kempt Road, Mill Bank and Kouchibouguac. Rev. H. Kent was reappointed to Dalhousie for another year, and Rev. J. Handy to Metapedia.

Rev. J. M. McLeod reported of the Augustan Committee. The worst grant were made Ecumina, New Carlisle, Tabusintac, Black River, Harcourt, Millerton. The congregation of Redbank had become self-sustaining during the year.

Rev. A. D. Archibald presented the report on Church Life and Work, which was of a very encouraging nature. It was discussed by several of the members present and ordered to be transmitted to the General Assembly.

Rev. D. Henderson reported that he had moderated in another call at Douglastown on the 22nd January, which had come out in favor of Rev. W. W. Rainie. The call was practically unanimous and was signed by 110 communicants and 123 adherents and accompanied by a guarantee of stipend of \$600. Messrs. Hugh Lamont, George Henderson, and Thomas Platt, were appointed by the congregation to support the call.

Mr. Lamont, was present, and was heard by Presbytery. After some discussion he agreed to increase the amount of stipend guaranteed to \$650. The call was then sustained and ordered to be forwarded to Mr. Rainie.
