AFTER 48 YEARS.

Purse of Gold From Employers to Mr. Christian.

Mr. Isaac Christian, who for nearly half a century has been connected with the Times, has handed in his resignation as pressman, and will take a well-earned rest from his labors. Mr. Christian received to-day a worthy compliment, when he was called into the manager's office and presented on behalf of the firm with a well-filled purse of gold to mark his retirement, and was assured of the appreciation and good-will of those for and with whom he has so long labored, and given a cordial invitation to always make himself at home in the establishment where he spent so many years of his life.

There are few men to-day who have a record of 48 years' continuous service in the employ of one institution, and that honorable distinction belongs to Mr. Christian. He entered the service of the Times in 1859, when, under the management of Mr. Thomas Gray, it was published in Hughson street, where the present Right House is situated. Men came and went, but Mr. Christian stayed, and the present Times Printing Company is the fifth management that he has served. In 1861 he was placed in charge of the power press, a Taylor cylinder machine, and there have been few working days since that time when he has not superintended the printing of the daily and weekly editions. For many years the Times has been issued from a rapid perfecting press, and the present machine represents the product of the best skill and invention obtainable by the great press builders, Hoe & Co., of New York. Mr. Christian has always been regarded as a Times institution, only two others of the present staff of employees dating back to the beginning of the present company's regime in 1873, and his determination to retire from the press room severs many old associations. He has always had the confidence of his employers and has proved worthy of the fullest trust. That he may enjoy health and happiness in his retirement is the wish of all connected with the Times.

Mr. Christian married in 1872 Miss Fannie Williamson, and has two sons and two daughters. The daughters are Celia (Mrs. Harry Dines), Fannie (Mrs. T. Fell), and the sons are Edmund, of Gore Bay, and Chas., of this city.

What Absinthe Is.

Several French medical authorities maintain that habitual drinkers of absinthe exhibit far greater deterioration of both the mental and bodily functions than can be accounted for by the amount of alcohol consumed, and have suggested that the action of absinthe in prohibiting its sale should be followed. In France absinthe is the favorite liquor of the dram dealer. Its fatal fascination for the inhabitants of that country, so bountifully supplied with the natural vine of its own vineyards, is hard to explain. Those whose tastes lie in the direction of something stronger would, if they were well advised, drink brandy distilled from wine, for this does not produce the deplorable effects known collectively as absinthism, against which the medical profession of France have for years been warning their countrymen.

Absinthe is said to have been introduced into France about sixty years ago by soldiers to whom it had been recommended as a febrifuge during the long war which resulted in the conquest of Algeria. It has, as many of our readers doubtless know, a peculiar yellowish green color, a powerful odor, and a very marked aromatic taste, in which oil of anise seems to prevail. Many formulas for making it have been given. They generally resolve themselves into one of two processes—namely, either (1) the pounded leaves, roots and flowering tops of various aromatic plants have been macerated, including wormwood (Artemisia absinthium), angelica root (Archangelica officinalis), sweet flag root (Acorus calamus) and star anise (Illicium anisatum), with the subsequent addition of oil of aniseed and syrup; or (2) the simpler method of dissolving the essential oils of wormwood, anise and coriander in rectified spirit, adding sugar and water, and coloring with chlorophyll. Absinthe is seldom drunk in a hurry by a thirsty and preoccupied individual standing at the counter of a public house. It has to be diluted by the consumer, and this may be done with various adjuncts which give some opportunity for the display of dexterity, just as in mixing a salad dressing or peeling an orange or dessert.
