

MISCELLANEOUS. DISINTERMENT OF THE MEDICI FAMILY OF FLORENCE.

The London Morning Post has an interesting letter from its Tuscan correspondent, giving an account of the celebrated Medici family of Florence, who for so long a period were the absolute rulers of that country. We make the following extract: When Lodovico XV. in his childhood asked his tutor if kings ever die, we are told that "Quelqu'un, Monsieur," was the cautious and courtly answer.

THE CROWNED HEADS AT STUTTGART. An American lady who witnessed the pageantry of the meeting of the royal families in that city, gives a full description of the scene, and of the great presence present, from which we copy the subjoined paragraph: "The Emperor of France wears red pants—has short legs; they remind me of a speech once made about his legs. I dare say you remember it. The Emperor of Russia is an elegant looking man; his family are noted for their beauty. The Princess of Orange is said to be the handsomest woman in Europe. The Empress of Russia is a regal looking woman. These ladies were dressed in white more antique silks; a stripe of white five or six inches wide and a stripe of the same width covered with the richest flowers here; and then in the white stripe there was an immense bunch of flowers. The dresses were all something in the same style—chip bonnets with white feathers and magnificent lace mantles. I cannot forgive the Queen of Greece for being a fat, fair, round-faced, red-faced, jolly-looking woman. I expected to see a 'maid of Athens,' and I do not like my romance spoiled. I was standing just behind the Queen of Holland, she turned and asked me for my countryman, Mr. Clark. I was quite surprised, as I had not been presented to her. The Queen of Holland is a most cultivated and elegant woman, still very handsome, though she has a grandson. She speaks English perfectly, and is, perhaps, the most accomplished woman in Europe. In the afternoon the Emperor and Empress of Russia left town. The French Emperor staid all the next day. On leaving here the Emperor of France gave fifteen thousand francs to the poor, and twenty thousand to the servants of the King's household. To those who waited on him personally he gave each a gold watch and chain. To the Aid-de-Camp, Casar Beroldingen, appointed him by the King, he gave buttons of diamonds, which cost an enormous sum; and to Count Urkul, Maréchal de la Cour, he gave a snuff-box with an immense diamond in the centre. The Emperor of Russia also gave handsomely; so the poor of Stuttgart have had a golden harvest."

ORIGIN OF PAPER MONEY. The Count de Tendilla, while besieged by the Moors in the fortress of Alhambra, was destitute of gold and silver wherewith to pay his soldiers, who began to murmur, as they had not the means of purchasing the necessities of life from the people of the town. "In this dilemma," says the historian, "what does this most anxious commander? He takes a number of little morsels of paper, on which he inscribes various sums, large and small, and signs them with his own hand and name. These did he give to the soldiers in earnest of their pay. 'How,' you will say, 'are soldiers to be paid with little scraps of paper?' Even so, and well paid too, as I will presently make manifest, for the good Count issued a proclamation ordering the inhabitants to take these morsels of paper for the full amount thereon inscribed, promising to redeem them at a future day with gold and silver. Thus by subtle and most miraculous alchemy did this cavalier turn worthless paper into precious gold and silver, and his late impoverished army abound in money." The historian adds, "The Count de Tendilla redeemed his promise like a royal knight; and this miracle, as it appeared in the eye of the Age, is the first instance on record of paper money, which has since spread throughout the civilized world the most unbounded opulence."

DEEP PLOUGHING. Some farmers deny that deep fall ploughing increases the yield of spring crops. Now we propose a method by which the truth or falsehood of the theory can be established beyond doubt. Let those of our agricultural readers who are sceptical on this point, each mark out an acre of ground, and divide it into seven equal parts. Let them plough these parts, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, and twelve inches deep; let them then cast each piece of ground alike next spring in putting in corn, oats, barley, spring wheat, or whatever the crop may be, and let the product of each piece separate from the others. The husband measures will then soon decide the matter. It is by just such methods as this that agricultural knowledge is increased. The experiment will cost but little, and may be of much benefit to thousands. It would be well, in furnishing a statement, to particularly note the character of the soil, and the state of the weather at the time of ploughing.—Prairie Farmer.
