The revelation is not a pleasant one, as it a shows that the failures in the last three years are fully three times more than what they were the previous year. But at the same time there is one gleam of improvement. The number of failures in the first nine months of 1877 was 1,646, with liabilities to the amount of \$20,904,000, against 1,256, with liabilities of \$17,786,000, in the first nine months of 1876, thus showing an increase of liabilities to the amount of \$3,118,000 in that time, while in the liabilities of \$111870 there is a decrease of \$7,000 as compared with those of 1876. It would thus appear that the last three have been less disastrous than the first nine months of 1877. But this we shall understand better on getting full returns.
