Gibbons was on his apparently very tired and holding on desperately, when the fifteen ound battle ended.

The result was distinctly a sur orise, as Dempsey was an over whelming favorite in the meagr etting to win a knockout with in six or seven rounds. The game Gibbons surprised even his most ardent supporters by carrying the hard hitting Dempsey in 15 rounds and outboxing him in spots. Dem psey outslugged Gibbons and lander the hardest punches, always tryins desperately to whip over a knock out punch. When the battle en ed, Gibbons was tired and rapidis feding from the cruel punishmen: that Dempsey inflicted around the ocdy. The challenger had to deand himself constantly in the 15th round to avoid a knockout punch.
